## As I See It

## Rules of the Game

As promised, this month we will tackle the complexities of Rule 801.03 Excessive Time. This is a fairly simple (and often abused) rule, so I may have time for a little editorial at the end. Let's get to it!

The excessive time rule is short and sweet. You have a maximum of 30 seconds in which to throw after 1) the previous thrower has thrown and 2) you have taken a reasonable time to get to your disc and mark it (with a mini marker disc) and 3) the playing area is clear and free of distraction. It really can't get much simpler than this.

I've noticed that many new players fail to grasp the concept of "ready golf" when they first begin to play. "Ready golf" means you think about your shot and your disc selection while you approach your disc, not when you get there. You limit your practice swings to 20 or under and you save that refreshing beverage or smoke for right after your shot, not right before it.

This may seem trivial to some, but keep in mind that in ball golf, slow play is cause for disqualification. The PDGA Rules committee has determined that 30 seconds is enough time to throw once you have marked your disc. Try this experiment sometime. Play nine holes of ready golf by yourself. Then play 9 holes of drag your butt, sloth-golf. Compare your scores. Nuff said.

I was going to share some info on rule 802.02 Mini marker disc, but I've recently addressed the PDGA Rules committee for clarification. I'll get back to you on that.

But, while we are on the subject of rules (here comes the editorial), let's talk about unwritten rules for a minute. Our great game has certainly borrowed many terms, rules, principles and practices from ball golf. That's a good thing. Ball golf is a gentleperson's game, and golf "ethics" are taught early and often on the golf course. I like that. Like Ultimate, it's self policed and when you gently remind someone to speed up, or be still or be quiet or move out of

the line of play, you make them a better golfer. If you get reminded, take it like a good sport and don't put yourself in that position again.

Here is a ball golf rule many of you may not know. On many "ball golf" courses, if you hit a hole-in-one, you have to buy a round of drinks for everyone in the clubhouse when you come in. I'm not kidding! Many courses sell "insurance" as part of their fees so you don't go broke on what should be a very happy day. Can you imagine having to sneak off the course after that long awaited ace because you can't afford the bill?

Maybe our club should charge an insurance fee, say 10% to a maximum of \$40 or \$50 of the total fund, for just such a purpose. This wouldn't be an additional fee, simply an assessment when the ace money was paid out. Let's face it, most of the time this isn't a problem. I saw Butch Fryer buy beer when he won \$20 and Steven Renner contributed even when he's nine years away from his first legal beer.

It doesn't matter if the winner drinks beer. What does matter is that the person is walking away with a fund built up by the very people he or she is playing with. Many of these people have never made an ace in their life and may never make one. But they keep playing and paying and hoping and they want to celebrate your luck or skill and it shouldn't be that hard to give back to the club. Especially if your skill level is considerably higher than average. And most especially if you haven't played that often. That doesn't mean you've had less chances to win. It means you contributed less to the fund.

So, should we consider a club rule? Frankly, we shouldn't have to. As I said, it's usually not a problem. Maybe this is one of those things where reminding friends of the "ethics" will do. So, get to remindin' and get to acing because I'm thirsty. Till next time, good throwin!



## Worlds '99

Steven and I went on a 1400 mile road trip to Rochester, New York for the 1999 PDGA World Disc Golf Championships August 6<sup>th</sup> through the 16<sup>th</sup>. My sole companion and caddy was awesome. He read maps, retrieved discs, gave me good advice on what to throw, carried my bag and, above all, he was a lot of fun to be with. Thanks Steven!

Practicing all four courses I realized how spoiled we are in Florida as there were NO cement tee pads. Three courses were temporary or seasonal. My favorite course, Chili, is a permanent one. Chili is a course with a sense of humor. It's the closest thing to putt putt mini golf, except the distance is not just a putt. Hole #11 was 911 feet. Another long hole, #18, 716 feet, finished with Olympic style. The pin sits on a hill, surrounded by International flags with a small grandstand nearby.

Every hole had some beautifully creative landscape. In addition, there were fake trees, tin trees, windmills, two silos, giant mulch piles, designer bridges, and fences. Their club really made something special out of donated flat farm land.

The second longest course, Genessee Valley, was good to me. I shot two rounds just over par. Slightly hilly and fairly open, but lots of O.B.'s. Water, road and bike paths were possible problems at every hole! I managed only one O.B. (in the water) during my two rounds.

Ellison Park was the most challenging for me as it's made up of uphill, downhill and crosshill shots. I'd blow past most of the short down hill shots. I felt like I was throwing a discus rather than a disc uphill. Crosshill looks flat almost, but it's very weird. I started to get it maybe at the end. SSP Roger Bunting told me he spent winters sledding here when he was a kid. I'm sure he had some wild rides.

Black Creek is a very nice park as well as disc golf course.

This course has many tight angled fairways. A few real short straight on's with little room to get through the woods. Mostly flat land except for one steep mountain. Holes #16 and 17 are a sharp hyzer going up. Hole #18 was the same with 500 feet to the pin. On the first day, second round, the water holes killed me. In two holes, #9 and #10, I had five O.B.'s, four of which I had to retee (I still have nightmares). I took a double circle six and triple circle 9. OUCH! I had my best round, 54, and my worst round, 66, here.

Steven was able to cash in on prizes at the awards ceremony for my triple circle 9, given for the highest score on any hole - at least that anyone owned up to! What a scammer! Steven also got a trip to the Wood Shed for his birthday. Linda Gowler and her son John took us to Paw Paw West Virginia. Deep in the mountains the Wood Shed is "the hardest disc golf course in the world!" a quote from Scott Stokely. An example of one hole: tee off down the mountain, cross over a lake, throw up a hill, then through the woods "Hey, I see the basket" hole in 7. Not bad, Linda tells me. We played glow disc that night under the Milky Way. The birthday boy shined making a 3 par on hole #8. Hyzer through the trees 300 feet, down the mountain to the pin. The Fowler's really made us feel at home.

I didn't win but I had an awesome adventure and great time. Special thanks go to Steven (ace bagger), Carole Daviau for buying my discs, Kim Baier for giving me collared shirts, Dan Smith for the use of his golf cart, Fast Mac for the cash and love, and to all the Sky Pilot's for your support and cash sponsorship.

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## The Great Lakeview Lumpfish and Cooter Challenge

The premiere of the Sky Pilots newest golf course took place on May 16. Located east of the interstate between Bee Ridge and Proctor roads next to Oak Park and Lakeview schools, this was a new challenge for most Sky Pilots. Unlike North Water Tower Park (NWTP) with vertical obstacles for the most part, Lakeview provides tougher horizontal obstacles from tree limbs with a meandering 30 foot wide creek thru the middle of the 12 hole course. Players must throw low on several holes that favor rollers. The course was designed tough by SSP #73 Dave Bonnell to provide an outlet for more experienced players and he delivers. When you drive into the park, it gives one the illusion that it is an open course, but on further examination it is closed with raised tee-pads and hidden baskets calling for big hyzer and anhyzer shots. Tom Reddecliff said it best, "Lakeview improves your game at Water Tower."

On Sunday morning, an informal doubles round of 12 holes took place instead of the usual NWTP doubles just to save time. After that there was FOOD - and lots of it! Tracy Fryer, using her phone tree, took the food to a new level with a pot-luck banquet that challenged even the Fright Feast. It was incredible! The hot-dogs and hamburgers that the club provided were a sad afterthought compared to the gourmet dishes brought by the general membership. Any description would be pale compared to the experience, and members should realize that this is not going to happen at every club function. Thanks to everyone who provided those wonderful side dishes.

The format for the Great Lakeview Lumpfish and Cooter Challenge was simple: two rounds of 12 holes back-to-back. Thirty-seven players were divided into their respective divisions of pros,

# SSP Proposed Improvements At North Water Tower Park

## What's going on with improvements at the park:

Beginning in March of 1997, the Park Improvements Committee (PIC) began meeting to make plans for the improvement of the Disc Golf Course and Park at the North Water Tower site. This was the result of the Sarasota Sky Pilots board becoming aware of an upcoming referendum in 1998, which would put the Local Option Sales Tax issue to a vote for City Residents. This measure was approved in 1998 and has resulted in money being budgeted for improvement purposes over the next ten years. Included in park improvements and beginning next year, after the Springtime Open, is the construction of a new water tower (design similar to Southgate's tower) and the demolition of the existing one. The water towers are a budget item separate from other course and park improvements. The initial cost estimate for park and course improvement was in the amount of \$545,000 to implement the anticipated changes.

## Current list of proposed park improvements:

1. Restrooms with lockable storage areas.
2. A new Main Picnic Pavilion with large barbecue grill.
3. More small cooking grills.
4. New roofed picnic pavilions scattered throughout the park.
5. New tot-lot and playground areas.
6. Beach volleyball.
7. Horseshoe pits.
8. Walking trails (6' wide mulch and away from fairways and landing areas).
9. One tennis court (on the right of hole six).
10. Three new bridges across the ditch at holes 4, 12 and 17/18.
11. Security lighting in parking and pavilion areas.
12. Water fountains.
13. Improved trash receptacles.
14. Benches at tees as required.

## Current Course improvements:

The Disc Golf course is also in need of improvement and a lot of it involves creating drainage/water retention, filling/leveling, and seeding or mulching as needed on a hole by hole basis. In some cases erosion control is needed to correct runoff problems. The ditch that cuts across the park (holes 4 and 12) needs to be excavated and the outflow pipe at Forty-fourth street needs to be lowered so that the park can drain properly. New Tee/AM pads and additional basket placements are indicated to increase challenges and alter play (Player input is needed!). Lastly, dead trees, stumps and other debris need to be cleared out of the park.

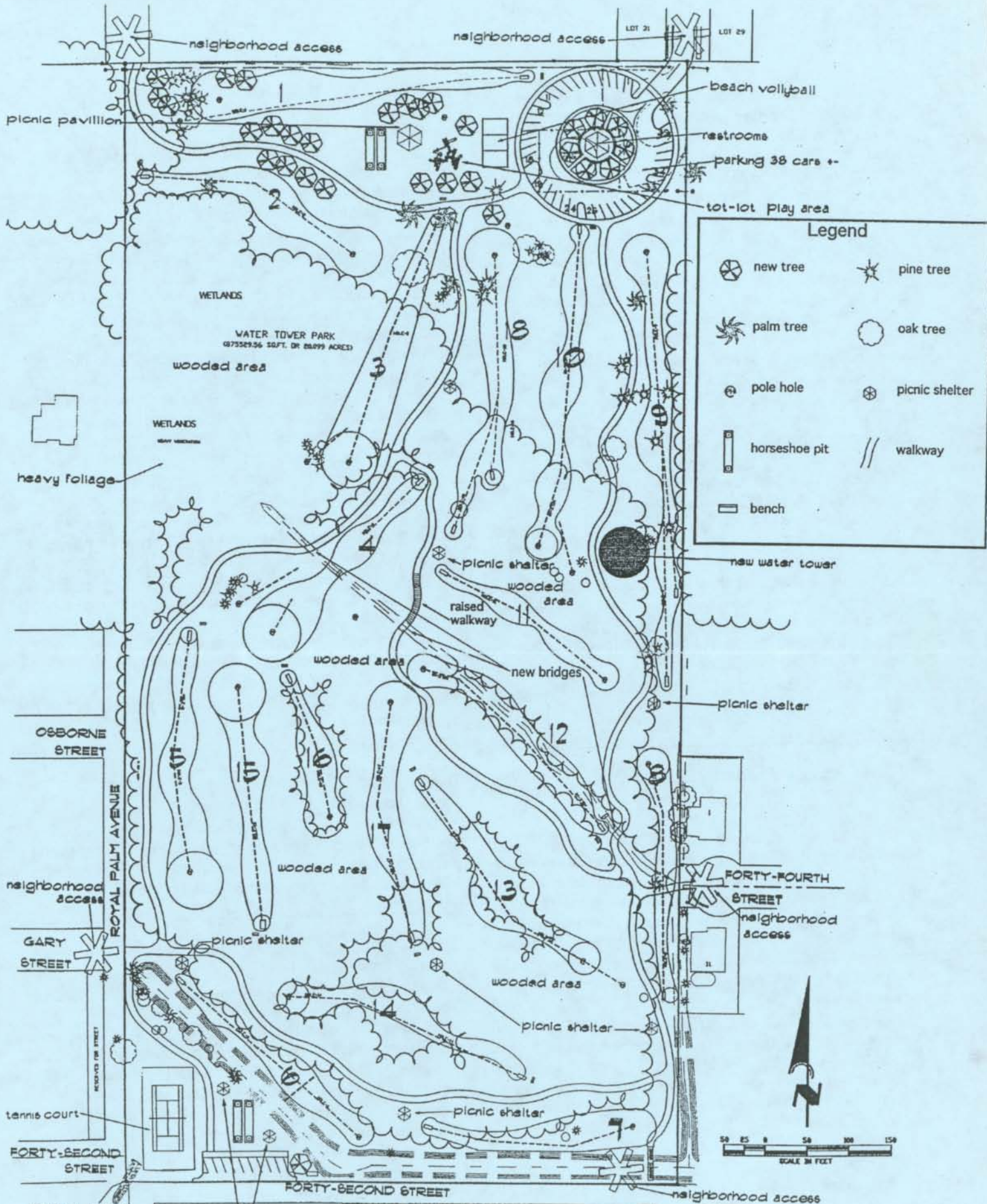

## PIC Park Design Guiding Principles:

1. North Water Tower Park is designated a Disc Golf Course by the City of Sarasota Parks and Recreation Board and therefore any improvements to the park should include the Disc Golf Course. Improved Disc Golf Course playability, appearance and challenges should all play a part in any upgrades to the facility.
2. Include as many requested new amenities/facilities as possible to the extent that they do not degrade the existing Disc Golf Course.
3. Disc Golf is a game of discipline and concentration every bit as much as regular golf. Design efforts should focus on removing and preventing distractions from the player's point of view.
4. Use walkways to keep non-golfers out of fairways and golf play areas so as to reduce the possibility of personal injury, distraction and damage to equipment.
5. Preserve the natural/native character of the park whenever possible.
6. Use Native/natural materials whenever possible.
7. Respect and preserve the existing wetland areas.
8. Respect the existing hardwoods and native growth whenever possible.
9. Respect neighbors' wishes whenever possible.
10. Design improvements to reduce crime and vulnerability to vandalism.

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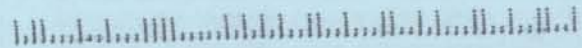

advanced, ams, and am women. They started at 2:30 in the afternoon and ended at 6:30.
