## A Word From the Pres.

As this is my last article as president of the 1999-2000 SSP, I will attempt a sort of "State of the Club" address. Traditionally, this type of address has 3 general parts: 1) Where we are now, 2) Some of "how we got here", and 3) Where we should be going in the near future. Being politically correct, I point out that this address is based solely on MY opinion. I truly look forward to going back to doing the As I See It column, because a year of writing this "bite my tongue" type of article has left me with a mountain of "tongue in cheek" type of material, a shorter tongue, and several bloody mouths. Alrighty then, here we go:

### 1) X = You are here.

Currently, we have two 18 hole courses, North Water Tower Park (NWTP) and the Lakeview Park Course (LPC), on which we run 3 weekly leagues: Tuesday night handicap at LPC, Thursday night handicap at NWTP, and Sunday morning best shot at NWTP. Also, we have "informal" weekly Friday happy hour in the park and Sunday afternoon Girl/Gang-O golf, both at NWTP. Daylight savings time forces all of this into the weekend, however.

We have around 340 members, governed by an elected 5 person Board of Directors (BoD): President, V.P., Treasurer, Secretary, and Event Coordinator. Operation of the club comes from our 5 permanent committees: Newsletter (NLC), Food, Maintenance, Competition, and Banquet, along with our "as we need you" Proposed Improvements Committee (PIC). Communication is key. Aside from our internationally recognized NLC, we have a P.O. Box, bulletin boards at each park, pamphlets/maps, a website and a Civic Liaison person who deals with City, County, and other civic organizations. Structure is provided as follows:

President - oversees the PIC and Civic Liaison position, and runs all BoD and General Membership (GM) meetings.

V.P. - oversees the Food, Maintenance, and Banquet committees. Fills in during a President's absence (or defection to Orlando, right Butch?).

Treasurer - handles ALL financial matters, which means dealing with all committees, tournaments, events, and merchandise.

Secretary - oversees the NLC and website primarily responsible for all written communication (membership/phone lists, bulletin boards, notices, etc.), and the almost impossible task of taking notes at BoD and GM meetings.

Event Coordinator - oversees Competition committee, who run our weekly leagues, helps in the planning and running of tournaments, events, etc.

Each committee elects its own chairperson. Committee chairs

work with the BoD. It takes time and a lot of effort, but this is how things get done. However, nothing is set in stone. Our club continues to grow, so our structure and processes must remain flexible to change. We adapt.

A big part of where we are now comes down to money. Where does the money come from? We basically have 3 consistent sources of income: membership and renewals, weekly leagues, and

## Rules of the Game

Normally this column deal with rules of the game...hence, the title. This month's article should probably be titled "Travels with Barry" (with apologies to Steinbeck).

Barbara and I had the good fortune to visit Maine and Toronto, Canada this last month. We had a busy itinerary but I packed a bag of discs and my PDGA course directory anyway. It never fails that when I send my disc golf bag through the X-ray at the airport, someone wants to look inside the bag. I'm not sure what they are expecting, but I always get a strange look when they find discs inside. I'll say "Disc Golf" and they look at me like I have three heads. Oh, well...one convert at a time, I guess. Just doing my part for the sport.

When we got to Maine, Barbara was hell bent to go whale watching and she had her sights set on Bar Harbour, Maine. We had rented a car in Buffalo, NY and driven over to Maine, entering the State at it's most southern tip and were working our way up the coastline. We made the obligatory visit to L.L. Bean (huge store, open 24 hours, expensive, not one disc in the place) and then pointed the car north for the 2 1/2 hour drive to Bar Harbour.

This is when I remembered that there was a course nearby in the town of Brunswick. Now I had spent the last two days either riding in a "mid-sized" rental car (a Stratus...drove straight but tended to turn over) or wandering through little gift shops packed with tourists and I was ready to play some golf. We got out the PDGA directory and proceeded to Enman Field as fast as possible.

Like most courses in Maine, Enman Field is a "pay to play" course. We got there kind of late (missed an exit with the help of my trusty navigator) but the proprietor said there was time to get 18 holes in. He went to find his brother, who had just started a round, while I changed shoes and limbered up.

These guys were as nice as they could be. Enman Field is owned and operated by the Enman brothers, Bob and Dave. They own the property and have carved two nice 18-hole courses through the woods. The cost was \$3 for a round or \$6 for the day. There was a nice trailer used as a clubhouse and office and discs and other golf items were in stock and for sale.

I'm not sure which brother I played with (sorry boys) but it's a good thing I had a guide since we finished in the dark. Both courses begin and end in the open area once occupied by a private landing strip owned by the Enman brother's dad. The rest of the course is carved out of thick, Maine woods. We played *The Beast* (the other course is *The Beauty*).

*The Beast* is an eighteen hole, par 72 course that is 5952 feet long. When I first saw the par was 72, I was suspect. When we started into the woods on hole number 2, I saw what it was about. Most of the wooded fairways are very tight and the woods are thick. Once you find yourself off the chain-sawed path, you've got problems. Plus, many of the holes were simply unreachable in two throws. I kept trying to imagine if and how a pro could park some of these holes in one or two shots and I'm not sure it could be done. Several of the holes

merchandise. We also receive generous amounts from members donating and sponsorships, but that is hard to track. Where does the money go? Tournaments, events, the banquet, work days, holiday picnics, new baskets, cement tees, sponsorships, more merchandise, etc. Operating costs include the P.O. Box, phone calls, stamps, score cards, bag tags, maintenance tools and equipment, cooking supplies, and oh yeah, FOOD! In the end, believe me, this is NOT a money making venture!

## 2) How we got here.

We got here through the individual efforts of our members and then the organized and focused efforts of those members. Somebody has an idea, we try it, then we adapt it until it works. Once it works, we do it over and over until it becomes a tradition. An example:

Traditionally, 1-2 weeks before a major event we have a work day to cut, clear, and clean up the course. The reward for the work is the round of golf afterward. To get the members out to do the work, we feed them. As long as we are feeding them and they are all together, it is a good time to have a GM meeting and so on. Each step was developed individually. OK, that is **how**, but the most important, **why?** Simple:

Ours is a social club that happens to play golf. Victory parties, happy hours, birthday parties, poker, gang-o-golf, feed the troops, holiday picnics, etc. Who else would even think about doing an Awards Banquet, the Fright Feast, the Great Lumpfish and Cooter Opens, or the Peggy King Memorial? My God, now-a-days Beth Wilson and her daughter, Sarah, are providing day care services for Tuesday night handicaps. And Bubba sticks have been reported as far away as the Midwest.

You see, Disc Golf is just the excuse we use to get together.

## 3) OK, so now what?

We need tighter fiscal controls. If we know where the money comes from, then we can project how much we bring in over a month, 3 months, and finally, a year. If we know where the money goes, project costs for a month, 3 months, and finally a year. We now have records we can use for reference on our projections. Sounds simple, right? But wait a minute, these are just projections. The true bottom line comes from membership involvement and membership response. What do you want us to do AND what are you willing to do to help?

Ultimately, it comes down to you. Even if you "just want to play golf", be sure to thank the people who got you the golf course to play on. Or if you only play the weekly leagues, thank the people who run them. Or if you only enjoy the tournaments, food, banquets, events, newsletters, etc., take a moment to thank the people involved. And you know, probably the best way to say thank you to these people is to jump in and help them with what they are trying to do. If you just like the weekly leagues, help sign people in. Tournaments, same thing. Food: organize, shop, cook, and serve. Newsletter - WRITE! If you like the clean and unique courses, help on a work day. You get my point. And you REALLY do get my point - 42 people showed up for a work day in August!

If you do just one of these things, the club continues!

So, what do you want the future to be?

Finally, I want to thank the committee people, the chairs, and the other members of BoD for working with me this past year. Together we have had another very successful year. To the membership, each individual member, I want to say thank you for electing me. It has truly been an honor and a privilege to have served and represented you. I will NEVER forget it.

### The Tower Park

I guess somebody out there is listening and said a prayer to make it rain. Shortly after I asked for some help from the powers that be, it started to rain. The course finally looks like it should in the summer. Everything is growing like crazy making the fairways a little tighter and a lot less forgiving than usual. I've heard some horror stories of going into the kudzu. There has been water in the ditch on hole #12 for most of the summer, which we hadn't seen for a couple of years. The grass is back and thick as ever, (no rollers right now) even where the trucks are driving in and out for the new tower. Check the schedule of events or the bulletin board for our next workday. The upcoming workday will not only help the course play a lot better, the Fright Feast 2000 should play smoother from our efforts. So please try to come out and help. While I'm on the subject of the Fright Feast, there is a possibility construction may conflict with us playing at the Tower Park. We are having a test night round at Lakeview Park on Friday the 13th in October. Hopefully, not too many discs will find their way into the water. Remember this is only a test of the Emergency Fright Feast Disc Golf Warning System.

The new water tower is built, at least the steel structure is there. The tower is still under construction, though right now it hasn't been painted and it looks like they are working on getting it hooked up and ready to go soon. The mobile phone station still has to be moved from the old tower to the new before the old tower can be taken down. I can't wait to see how they take the old tower down; I definitely want to be there for some of that. So far the construction appears to be on schedule and the November date of completion of the tower could be real.

The next step after the water tower is the improvements to the park. I'm not sure what the City is planning to do first, or when for that matter (I wonder if they even know). One of the priorities of the new BoD will be to find out what the timetable is for this part of the project. In the meantime we are going to schedule the Ice Bowl 2001 to be played at Lakeview. The Springtime Open, scheduled for 2 weekends in March, will be tentatively planned for the Tower Park until I can find out what the timetable for the improvements are. were almost C shaped, with tight and heavy overhead foliage so that a huge throw straight at the basket was impossible.

It was fun though. Mr. Enman was in tight competition with a friend and I concentrated on not losing any discs. We finished up after dark. I thought I had lost my disc on the last hole but we found it (with headlights) parked three feet from the basket (I don't know why we didn't look there first). I managed a 71, beating the owner by one and losing to his buddy...not bad for my first time out. I wish we had more time. These guys were super nice. Go there if you get a chance.

We left Enman Field after dark and drove two hours north so that we would be near Bar Harbour the next day. On the short drive into Bar Harbour the next morning, we passed a large Frisbee Golf sign on the highway. I made a mental note and we proceeded to Bar Harbour for a big day of whale watching and lobster eating. On the way back that evening we pulled in and found the course was another pay to play course called Hapana in Trenton, Maine. This course was also privately owned. A small shack served as a clubhouse and pro shop. There were 18 holes (par 63 and 3748 feet) again cut through the Maine woods. However, we got there too late to play. The costs seem to be consistent throughout the state and, unlike Enman Field, this course closes from October to March.

Two days later we arrived in Toronto, Canada. The first thing we did was locate Centennial Park for a little golf. The PDGA directory said there were 27 holes, 18 with paved tees. Turns out that there were only 9 paved tees and they were holes 10 through 18. Since I could find those holes, I started on 10 and hoped 27 would end somewhere near the first tee.

Centennial Park has a lot of day activity. The course is long and open in many places. In the middle it climbs a ski slope (three very tiring holes) with number 18 launching from the top of the small mountain 375 feet down to the basket... very cool. I was playing by myself, most of the time not sure where I was going, so I played badly. Still, it beat sitting in the Stratus or in a gift shop so I was happy. I managed not to hit any of the million people in the park. I had to guess at the exact tee spot on a number of the unpaved tees.

So, there's my report on Yankee golf. Those pay for play courses are popping up all over Maine. The Enman brothers are planning additional courses as of this writing. They said they had between 100 and 150 players a day. Pretty impressive! Check them out when you get that way and in the meantime, good throwin'.

ing new tee areas, and general maintenance to the whole course was done. A special thanks to Bryan Mott for bringing out a truck with a extending bucket which made trimming up the trees possible. I don't think the course would be nearly as playable without it, besides it was fun watching Dave Bonnell up in the bucket cutting away the branches with a chainsaw. Several of the new holes are very short and tight AND have water all around them. This is Lakeview Park, so we wanted to get the water as part of the course. Many of the holes are very aceable, in fact hole #14 didn't even make it through the first official round of play without being aced by John Osgood.

The course is hopefully going to stay 18 holes for a while pending the installation of a Paws Park that has been planned for this park. When the Parks Dept. decides to put in the dog walk area, we will redesign the course to fit into what is left of the park. Right now there are 14 Mach II baskets and 4 converted Tri-state baskets which belong to our local players. The course may become 12 holes again or 14 or maybe 9 holes with 2 sets of pads. We'll cross that fairway when we come to that point. In the meantime come out and check out the new holes. They are fun

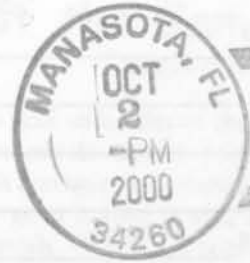
