NEW DISTANCE RECORDS SET

The best distance thrower in the world, Chris Voigt, just broke Scott Stokley's record by throwing a 170 Discraft XS 217.05 meters. There was a steady 10-15 mph wind and Chris got off a near perfect, fairly high anhyzer that they knew was a record the moment it hit the ground. It was shot with a laser and then a tape measurer which produced nearly identical results. The distance in feet was apx. 711.92 feet.

Scott Stokley was satisfied to break the sidearm distance record with a throw of 158 meters (518.24 feet) with a 163 gram Discraft XS.

Randy Lahm, perhaps the best "unknown" distance thrower in the world over the past 15 years, set the world masters distance record with a throw of 185 meters (606.8 feet) with a 160 gram Discraft XS.

Other fun records broken include:

Chris Voigt threw a mini 124 meters (406 feet) and rolled one 398 meters (1305 feet). Randy Lahm also set the roller distance record with a roll of 1156(not a typo) meters (3791.68 feet) with a Discraft XS. Lacy Rofkar established a womens roller record of 1017 meters (3338.56 feet) with a Discraft XS.

Friday, March 16, 2001

Jonny V, Terry Miller, and Dane's Spring Break started at 3:30 pm on Thursday, March 15th in Milwaukee, WI. Dane started his Iron Man driving shift by going Hwy 94 to Chicago. With the rain/sleet and hitting Chicago rush hour, we spent an extra 1.5 hours in Chicago. After getting through Chicago we traveled into Indiana on Hwy 65. We traveled through Indiana, KY, TN, and partially through Georgia, just before Atlanta, before Dane decided to give up the driving duties. He drove 14 straight hours, what a stud. Terry was lucky enough to hit Atlanta before the morning rush hour and we cruised through Atlanta making good time. Terry drove about 100 miles and then we decided it was time for a nap break. An hour and a half later, Dane was back at the wheel and he drove to the Florida border and then gave the wheel back to Terry to finish up the 23 hour marathon of driving.

We stopped in at the hotel to find out that our room was not ready yet, so we headed straight to the course, North Watertower Park. The park is a good mix of tight and open holes, all but 2 within reaching distance for the average player. The course could be compared to a shorter Steven's Point in Wisconsin. We pulled in about 10 minutes prior to random draw doubles was to begin. We shelled up our \$10 a piece and were matched up with our partners. All three of us managed to pick up Amateur players for the doubles. The two teams containing JV and Dane finished up the round at even, while Terry and his partner came in with 9 down. This was only good enough to tie them for the bottom cashing spot. After the CTP, Terry and his partner came out on the bottom with their entry fee back. The winners shot a new course record of 16 down out of 18 holes. An excellent round out here.

Right now we are just chilling in the hotel making our phone calls and updating this website. We hope to update this page at the end of each day before bed. So check back daily. Tomorrow is the Allstate Springtime Open, rounds 1 and 2. Wish us all luck... some of us will need it.

Saturday, March 17, 2001

John Osgood is the name of the day, but I'll get back to that in a minute. The 85 degree day with the sun beating down hot and heavy treated some of us alright for the day. After the first round, Dane was on the top of the second card in Adv while shooting a par on the 18 hole course. JV came in after struggling during the first round with a 5 over. I had putted very poorly but still managed to come in with a 6 under. First round I had the pleasure of shooting with the 14 year old Evan Gurthie (pro) and John Osgood. Oh, another side note to round one, JV and Dane had the honor of not only playing together but also with the 11 year old Garrett Gurthie.

Second round changed only two tees that added some serious distance to their respective holes. Dane said he fought hard to get to

Rules of the Game

This edition of *Rules of the Game*, as you soon will discover, is really the second edition of *Travels with Barry*. Writing an article on rules is not the easiest thing to do. Many of the rules of disc golf are painfully obvious and those who need to learn about the rules are usually the last ones to actually read them and the very last ones to read an article about them. There will be some rules discussed before the end of the article, so hang in there. But first, lets go traveling.

I had the good fortune to visit Houston, Texas in late March. As always, I packed my disc golf bag and my PDGA Course directory. I always take my discs as carry-on luggage on the plane, thinking that should the airline lose my clothes, at least I can play golf while they look for them. There was no lost luggage on this trip, but, as usual, the golf bag had to be opened at every x-ray machine along the way. I've never made it through the x-ray without having to open up that bag and explain what disc golf is.

I was visiting my sister, who works in Houston but who lives in The Woodlands, a very upscale, made to order, highbrow, model town about 35 miles out of the city. You know any town that is so special that it has dubbed itself "The Woodlands" instead of Woodlands or Woodland must think a lot of themselves. It is a special place. No stores are visible from the roads, a local community pool about every ¼ mile, parks everywhere, bike lanes and jogging paths along every road. Not one pick' em up truck in the whole damn town. This ain't Texas, it's a highfallutin freak show!!

The Woodlands (my pinky finger starts curling every time I say it) has one redeeming feature...a disc golf course. And it was only about five minutes from where I was staying so I played at least once every day. The course, called Bear Branch, is a fun layout, spread out around a park primarily dedicated to soccer fields. The course isn't very long, with only one hole over 500 feet and a couple in the short 400's.

The first four holes center around a small pond that was almost always occupied by a couple of guys swimming for discs. The weather was in the 60's most days, but guys swam for their "\$15 disc" anyway. Hole #5 was located about 100 yards away, after crossing between two soccer fields. Much of the course from here skirts these improved fields and lays in the low lying woods on the outside of the park. There were quite a few soggy places, but the trees made it challenging. As well, elevation changes from the improved field to the surrounding woods made some of the holes very interesting. There were three tees on most holes, but they were dirt and many were either worn out, making footing iffy, or they were full of water.

Whoever designed this course must have been a left-handed thrower or someone who lives off the flick. Almost half of the holes were solid left to right shots. It was a big challenge and good practice.

This park had a lot of activity. There were a lot of people playing every time I played and the players were very friendly. With this type of usage, I expected that everyone would be familiar with the rules of golf etiquette. This didn't seem to be the case. Most groups that I encountered just didn't seem to be aware of faster playing groups behind them. The pond, especially, seemed to be a big bottleneck. I understand stopping to swim for your \$15 disc, but there is no need to hold up groups behind. Most days, my sister was playing along and she is a beginning player. As you might imagine, if we were pushing groups ahead with a rookie, they were playing too slow and should have waived us through.

One day we drove about 30 miles south of Houston to "The Wilmont", home of the Texas State Championship. They say everything is bigger in Texas and this course certainly lives up to the billing. First, there was a large grill under a pavillion near the beginning of the course. This grill was so large, you could skin a cow whole and throw it on the grill and still have room for hotdogs.

The Wilmont was just as large. The course is laid out on a huge, flat low-lying field, bounded on the south by a raised levee, on the west by a canal and by wetlands and a very high raised earthwork surrounding a stage on the north. The first few holes ran along the levee, with a very steep drop to water if you were too far left. The holes wandered out into the flat lands (and they were very wet flatlands), and back along the levee again, ending with the #8 basket in the corner of the levee and the canal. Miss this putt and your next shot is from 100 feet below.

From hole #9 on, The Wilmont gets mean. Hole #9 is 776 feet, straight into the wind. Number 11 is 712 feet into the wind. Number 14 plays two basket locations. The day I played, it was in the short position of 678 feet. The long position is 1030 feet. Hole #15 is straight up the side of the earthwork and #16 is 590 feet, throwing off the earthwork 100 feet down to and over the wetland. In all, 5 holes over 535 feet long and 4 over 700 feet long and there seems to be a stiff wind prevailing from the north at all times. The scorecard said the course was over 8000 feet in the long positions. It was only 7383 feet the day I played. The Wilmont was challenging and humiliating. I did manage to break par for a beginner, as posted on the sign, but was a few strokes short of par for a pro.

So there you have my Texas trip...short on rules, long on long holes. I never travel anymore without my disc golf bag and you shouldn't either. I have trips planned for Nashville, London and Paris planned for later this year so look for more reports in the future. In the mean time, good throwin!

As I See It

This is the story of how the Sarasota Sky Pilots Disc Golf Club came to be known as, well... the Sarasota Sky Pilots Disc Golf Club (SSP). It was February 1994, which meant that the "club" had already existed for 5 months without an official name. That is not to say that there hadn't been suggestions. We weren't going to have just any ol' name though. So, names like Sarasota Sailors, DeSoto Discers, ManaSota Disc Sports Club, the Tower Tossers, the Flinging Frisbee Freaks (boy, am I glad that one didn't catch on) and the always bland Sarasota Disc Golf Club were among the suggestions.

We did what we seem to do best – we debated it! Even though we had already spent 5 months debating over the name, we continued to debate it. His thought was that we needed a name so we could come up with a logo, so we could print club T-shirts, so we had *something* to give people when we asked them for \$20 to join our club. Imagine this conversation...SSP member (M), "Hi, would you like to join our club?" Prospective member (PM), "Sure, I support the sport. What is your club's name?" M, "Well, we don't have one yet." PM, "So what do I get for my 20 bucks?" M, "Well, um, right now nothing, but you will become a member in good standing." PM "I see. Well, why don't I just start my own club, call it Nothing and don't give out anything for joining? That way I will have the exact same thing, and I can just keep my 20 bucks." M, "Come to think of it, that's not a bad idea. Can I join?"

We really needed a name. Our first president, after fuming around the debate table at the pavilion, finally said, "We need a falcon (pronounced fall-kin) name! Y'all have got 2 weeks to agree on a name or I will come up with one! And you know I am not very bright, so I just might come up with something stupid!"

During the course of the next 2 weeks, Perr (SSP #2) heard a song on the oldies station that caught his attention. He brought it up at the debate table. It was a song from the 1960's called Sky Pilot. The song intended to take shots at the World War II chaplains (Sky Pilots) who would bless the bombers as they took off on their bombing missions. That's not to say there weren't people who did not (and still don't) like the name. As a matter of fact, the Nothing Club was an in-town rival for a brief period. However, imagine how that conversation went. A prospective member (PM) being approached by both a Nothing Club member (NC) and a SSP member (SSP), "Hey, want to join our club?" PM, "Sure, I support the sport. But which club should I join? What is the name of your club?" NC, "Nothing!" SSP, "We are the Sarasota Sky Pilots Disc Golf Club!" PM, "The Sky Pilots, huh? I guess I really don't know what that means. Actually, it sounds kind of dumb. But I suppose that's better than Nothing."

his 4 over par, while Jonny said his 5 over came relatively easily. Again, my putting killed me but I managed to come in with a 5 under. Second round I had the pleasure of shooting with Ben and Evan Gurthie, Keith, and Mike Byrd.

Now to John Osgood. As I said, I played with him first round and he jumped out birding very quickly. He cooled off and finished 9 down. That was 2 behind Kenny at the time. The course has 8 alternate pin locations that do not necessarily make it longer or shorter, just different routes. Overall, it might play a stroke or two easier. People that were shooting way under par, were shooting way over and so on. Dane's even was a pretty solid round, moving him from the bottom of the 4th card to the top of the 3rd.

He had his 20 footer hit basket and role 30 feet on the first hole, then he proceeded to miss that. Yes a bogey on the first hole while the rest of the group birdied. KC even remained BOB (bottom of the box) all the way until hole 5. The course simply didn't want to give me any breaks. I felt like I was playing ok but I just couldn't seem to get anything going. Ken was 3 down after the front nine and struggling for that. However, he proceeded to get 8 of 9 in the back and proved why he is the champ. Bucky finished with an 8, Mike Byrd shot a 7, John Osgood had an 8 and I had a very sad 1 under par.

The fourth and final round had Dane sitting in the middle of the third card in Adv. Jonny played with Vidar and said he was one of the coolest and most fun guys he's met. Dane proceeded to tear up the course and finished very strong with his best round of the event with a 4 under par. Jonny said his game came together slightly to finish with a 3 over.

I was, of course, bumped to the 2nd card with my sad 1 under. I was sitting comfortably in the last cashing spot, 8th place for 50 bucks. Gregg Hosfeld and John E. McCray each had me by 2 and I had 9th place by 2 as well. This round my game all came together. I went on a putting and birdie tear shooting 6 down in the first 7 holes. I picked up a few more birds and was leading Gregg and John by hole 15. Then it all came crashing down. I took a 5 on a 168 foot VERY wooded hole. I simply couldn't get to the basket. I then took a 5 on a very routine par 2 or 3. These fives would drop me all the way to tied for 8th place. I beat John E McCray, but 2 guys (Ben Gurthie being one of them) shot 9 under to come from the 3rd card to squeak ahead of me by 1. I tied Evan Gurthie for 8th which got me \$25. Very disappointing after tearing up the first 15 or so holes.

Dane's solid 4 under got him to the tied for 6th position which was good for \$73 in merchandise. Jonny did NOT finish DFL, instead finished 4 or 5 spots from it. Kenny did go onto win it by 6, Osgood in second, Bucky in third, Hosfeld in fourth, Mike Byrd, Ben G, and Shawn tied for 5th, 6th, 7th. As I said, in the 25 person field, I finished tied for 8th. We said our goodbyes to some really great people that helped make our visit to FL so much fun. The Gurthie boys are truly a great group of kids that love the sport and other players as everyone really should. Thanks to Bucky, Ken, Osgood, Tim Willis, the other Tim, and everyone else who helped make this event really an awesome B-Tier event. Also, I'd like to send a shoot out to my new Southern US idol, Mike Byrd.

Off to Orlando for the night. The rain held off during play all weekend long but during the awards and drive to Orlando, we went through some rain and storming. Our adventures are not completely laid out for the next few days. They will include golfing, shopping, relaxing, driving and probably some clubbing.

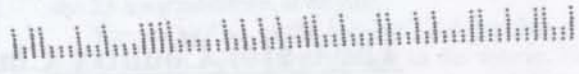
