Disc Golf

You bombed your drive 330 and then shaped a shot around a tree to a target you could barely see. Now comes the pay off: a putt that hits home with a satisfying clacka-ching!

You're playing disc golf, and your target is not a hole but vertical chains attached to a pole hanging over a steel basket. The game is faster, cheaper, and healthier than the game disc jocks call "ball golf."

"Players get hooked after they make a few good shots," says disc golf touring pro Todd Branch, 33, of Richland, MI. "A hole in one might excite you enough to make this your game – and aces are common in disc golf."

The sport's inventor, "Steady Ed" Headrick, created the modern Frisbee for Wham-O toy company and still turns up at PDGA events, but younger stars like Branch play a whole nother game. Call it disc-o-tech. Players lug specialized tools in their bags: Some discs are designed to turn left, some to turn right, and some to land on their edge and roll long distances. Most of the 1,000 or so disc golf courses in the US (PDGA.com has a directory) are par 54 layouts and feature par 3's that range in length from 200 to 450 feet.

Make it around in 50 floating, fluttering drives, approach shots, and airborne "putts," and you can think about joining the 5,000 pros of the PDGA. But don't count on earning much more than lunch money.

"Top pros make about \$10,000 a year in prize money, plus another \$2,000 to \$5,000 from sponsors like disc manufacturers and disc-golf-bag makers," Branch says. "I traveled with three other players in a '73 Winnebago identical to the one Kevin Costner had in *Tin Cup*." A recent feature on DiscLife.com reported that a year on tour costs about \$14,850 – which leaves the game's best players a profit of about \$150 a year.

Why bother? To beat long-drive champ Chris Max Voigt's world-record toss of more than 700 feet? To match Branch's personal best, a 355-foot ace? To play 18 holes in two hours, pay greens fees of \$0, and toss a 50-mph whizzer that can chop off a tree branch?

Nah, there's more. Like the scene at the annual Texas State Championships, where an exhibition round features a team of disc golfers taking on a team of ball golfers at a public (ball) golf course in Houston – each group playing their own game. Guess what: The disc jocks keep winning. "What we lack in distance we make up for in the short game," says Branch. "We typically make all our putts inside 35 feet."

Rules of the Game

Did you know that there are 179 PDGA approved discs? I didn't either until I started doing a little research regarding disc (and pole hole) design. 179 approved discs is pretty amazing, especially when you consider what a manufacturer has to do to get a disc approved. Check out Rule #805 in the rule book or look up the Technical Standards at PDGA.COM. To be legal for the PDGA, a disc has to be a production type disc available commercially to the public in numbers of at least 1500. There is a \$200 fee payable to PDGA to have a disc tested for approval. Minor changes to a disc, such as a change in plastic, changes in any dimension or name changes require that the disc be re-tested.

Rule #802.1C states that a player may not make post-production modifications of a disc which would alter the original flight characteristics of the disc. *Inevitable wear and tear from usage during play* or moderate sanding is okay. I find this very interesting. It appears that slamming a new disc into a wall or large tree would be illegal. I've seen some players bend an unstable disc to help it turn over, and it appears this is illegal too.

There is an interesting article at DOLF.COM that gives instructions on how to modify the flight characteristics of a disc. You may want to check it out. This article points out some basic characteristics of plastic and how it can be molded using heat and cold. The writer, Fred Chittendon, points out that the PDGA does not allow this post-production manipulation, and he also warns that disc adjustment is unpredictable. Still, the idea that one could change that new Viper into a turnover disc is appealing.

Mr. Chittendon questions why some disc flight alteration should not be allowed. Lets face it, every time you taco your disc into a tree you are changing the flight characteristics. Why can't we experiment a little, especially if we don't alter the plastic by shaving off the edges?

Fred Chittenden, a dentist and disc golfer, has developed a new PDGA approved basket (with an approach from above) and some interesting ideas on basket and course design. There is an extensive discussion on the subject. Fred maintains that allowing one to approach the basket from 360 degrees is inconsistent with the design of a ball golf course. He has designed baskets that can effectively block putts coming from certain angles, thus adding a degree of difficulty and making short courses more challenging. I've heard some equate the concept to having sand traps around a ball golf putting green. It's an interesting idea, but I already find putting too difficult. Check out the site though, because the discussion is intriguing and he has designed some affordable baskets for at home use or for PDGA approved courses.

Thanks to Butch (#36) Fryer for making me aware of DOLF.COM and for his incessant complaint that PDGA rules specify that a basket should be approachable from all sides and that the bottom of the basket is a side (I know Butch but without a bottom there really is no basket). And thanks to Mr. Chittenden for making us think.

The banquet or WHO we should pay tribute to. Each year in the July issue of the Flight Log, I try to get people to start thinking about the year end awards banquet, which is scheduled at the Eagles Club, on Saturday, October 6. The banquet ends our current fiscal year and begins the next one. It is a time when we celebrate and honor the outgoing Board of Directors (BoD), and by announcing the election results, we welcome the incoming BoD members. It is also a time to say thank you to the individual (active) members who have contributed so much to the club throughout the year by their donation of time and effort to committees, special events, work days, tournaments, etc. At last year's banquet, we handed out 37 different awards. The more traditional awards are included on the elections ballots. Here is a breakdown on these awards and what they are for:

Disc Golfer of the Year. Usually this is given to the active member who best represents the club with their successful play in tournaments, leagues, or other competitive disc golf activity.

Sky Pilot of the Year. This award usually goes to the active member who, in the past year, has given the most of themselves to the club through their work for the club, generosity, dedication, and/or unselfish effort. Someone you would point out as "The club member I am most proud to be associated with".

The Bubba Award. This is for the year's best bonehead

stunt, silly comment, mistake, etc... the best laugh you had this past year. This is NOT NEGATIVE! This is intended to be a friendly chuckle we can all relate to. For example, if you forgot to pay your renewal dues and aren't an active member, then you could be in the running! To make this decision even more difficult, Bubba Wank is RETIRED! He can be the Grand-ba, Great-ba, Supreme-ba, or whatever, but don't vote for him! Be creative and spread this award around. It is just for fun.

The L.A.A.W. The highest honor the SSP can bestow on any one member is to name them the Lifetime Achievement Award Winner (L.A.A.W.). This is our Hall of Fame. It is decided by the existing LAAW members (of which there are only 7) and the outgoing BoD. However, membership input is not only welcomed, it is necessary. A good example of the criteria used to determine WHO should receive the LAAW can be seen by WHO received it last year - Dana Sheridan, SSP #5. Dana served on the BoD as Secretary our first year (Oct. '93-'94), then became President for our 2nd year (Oct. '94-'95). During her year as President our first course was created and installed (NWTP - North Water Tower Park), the newsletter was started, and our membership doubled. Dana is the one who started the Awards Banquet (our first President wasn't bright enough to think of it), and she gave out the first two LAAW's.

Tough act to follow, huh? Yes, but just look at some of the people who are definitely in the running:

Butch Fryer. Do you like the course map? Butch created it. How about the pamphlet that the County Parks & Rec. puts out? You know, the one with the map to the park, course map, scorecard, and description of the park, etc.? Butch, Butch, Butch, and Butch. Butch created the membership/phone list. Butch's work on the club database and newsletter are legendary. Oh yeah, Butch also was Sky Pilot of the year '97, has served on several committees, Secretary twice '95-'96 and '96-'97, was elected VP and then in an absolute crisis, took over as President when we had to have him '98-'99.

Tyler Brant. Sky Pilot of the year '98, served as chair of the maintenance committee 3 times, and currently donated tons of work as a member of the competition, food, and banquet committees, was VP '97-'98, is our present Treasurer '00-'01. With his quiet, humble, yet humorous demeanor, the guy is a real, class human being.

John Osgood. Speaking of a class act! Don't we all wish we had his natural, championship skills at playing this game, combined with his mature, generous, modest, and charitable personality? Does he keep any of his winnings (ace funds, birdie pools, league and tournament \$\$\$)??? Or does he just donate it to the club, basket funds, next event or charitable cause? Though he has yet to serve on the BoD, he did chair the competition committee for 4 years, has never missed a work day in 8 years, and has won both the Sky Pilot and Disc Golfer of the Year awards. J.O. has been here from the beginning. He was a major force in the design of the NWTP course. I will never forget the fact that J.O. and Jimmy Osgood accounted for 40% of the 216 signatures needed to start the club back in '93. Hey, J.O. IS the Sky Pilot we all hope to be.

Carole Daviau. Three words - money, food, leadership. She earned the nickname "sponse" because she has donated her business's entire annual advertising budget to the Allstate Springtime Open and the Fabulous Florida Tour for the past 4 years, making

The Tower Park

A lot has happened in the last few months at NWTP. The new water tower is finally finished! Shortly after that, a fence was put up around the old tower for protection as the old tower was taken down. Parking sure was a mess while that was going on. Hole #10’s tee pad got an impromptu moving to it’s current location 50 feet shorter. We made up for that by moving the short pin position to a longer back left pin position, about 100 feet from the base of the new tower. Hole #11’s right pin position is now moved back 75 feet also.

I must say that I was disappointed at how unexciting the old tower coming down was. Ninety percent of the work was done by one guy! The whole thing was cut up into manageable size pieces, loaded by crane onto trucks and carted away. I was hoping for something with pyrotechnics and lots of flying twisted hunks of metal. Maybe I need to stop watching Battlebots and Junkyard Wars on TV, NOT! Anyway the tower is gone, the fence is down, and we have a slightly larger parking area for now. Next comes the much needed improvements to the park, a nice new pavilion, drinking fountains, and restrooms. We can only hope most of it gets done before the Springtime Open 2002.

“Well there ain’t no cure for the summertime blues...” The rains have come, along with the dreaded mosquitoes, and everything is soggy. This is how the park was when we first started playing here. 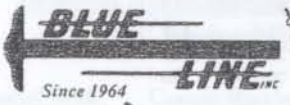
