Widespread but only partial news coverage was given recently to a remarkable editorial broadcast from Toronto by Gordon Sinclair, a Canadian television commentator. What follows is the full text of his trenchant remarks as printed in the Congressional Record:

Rules of the Game

There was a very memorable photo of Tiger Woods in Sports Illustrated last year, showing him pulling up short when he was about to make a drive. I'm pretty sure the picture was taken at the Masters in Augusta. Apparently someone behind the tee was taking pictures of Tiger in the middle of his swing and he actually stopped in mid-swing to admonish them.

There were several things that struck me about the picture. First, I had witnessed the same scene on TV while watching live coverage of the event. The commentators had discussed in length about how strong Tiger had to be to be able to stop his downward swing on the ball without hurting himself. This guy really does have phenomenal strength and when he starts swinging at the ball, it isn't easy to stop the process.

Second, I wondered how on earth the galleries at ball golf tournaments are able to be as quiet as they are. If you've ever been to a PGA event, especially a Major, you know that the crowds are very respectful. Yeah, there is the occasional loudmouth but they don't last long at PGA tournaments. One warning, maybe two at the most and a noisy fan will be quickly escorted of the golf course.

Third, I wondered how golfers actually manage to deal with the quiet. We've all heard the "You da man" jerks at almost every Major. Knowing that some idiot is going to scream "You da man" at you at the exact moment that you make contact with the ball ought to make you a nervous wreck. Yet, there they are at every tournament and that behavior seems to be tolerated.

When you think about it, noise is an integral part of most sports. Baseball players, especially hitters and pitchers, are subjected to very loud and very personal insults on every pitch. Football, hockey and soccer players play with a ton of crowd noise. Come to think of it, tennis and billiards are two of the few sports other than golf that put a premium on quiet crowds.

What brought all of this to mind was a story I heard recently about one of our members. I don't want to embarrass anybody so we will call this member "Bubba" (not that Bubba...the new Bubba). I did not witness this event, but the word on the course is that "Bubba" was making a drive from the tee and shanked his disc out of bounds. Apparently another member in the party had made some incidental noise (by shuffling discs in a bag or cart) during the drive and Bubba demanded another throw, quoting the "incidental noise" rule. "Bubba" demanded a re-throw and after some discussion was allowed the re-throw by the group in which he played.

Upon hearing the story, I quickly went to my rulebook for clarification. The subject is covered right off the bat, in Rule #801.01 B. The PDGA rules start with Rule #801 Conduct of Players, so this one really shouldn't have been too hard to determine had anyone bothered to look.

It is worthwhile to quote Rule 801.01 B. verbatim: Players should take care not to produce any distracting noises or any potential visual distractions for other players who are throw-

ing, slapping course equipment, throwing out of turn, throwing or kicking golf bags, and advancing on the fairway beyond the away player. Shouting at an appropriate time to warn someone in danger of being struck by a disc is not a violation of courtesy.

By stating that a shouted warning is not a courtesy violation, this rule implies that shouting at an inappropriate time would be a courtesy violation. Further, all the other examples of discourteous actions are rather overt behaviors that would be very hard for a golfer to ignore. There is no mention of "incidental noise".

A courtesy violation could possibly have been called in this matter, but personally I don't think it would have been appropriate in this case unless a prior request for quiet on the tee had been made and subsequently ignored. Regardless, once a courtesy violation warning has been given, the consequence is a penalty stroke assessed to the warned player for each subsequent courtesy violation of any kind for the remainder of the round. There is no provision for a re-throw by the offended thrower.

Don't get me wrong. I'm not saying that the rules of etiquette aren't important in disc golf. On the contrary, they are just as important as they are in ball golf. But both rulebooks seem to imply that the ultimate responsibility lies with the golfer. If you aren't ready to throw, pull up. If conditions aren't right, wait until they are. Once you let go of that disc, you are committed to the results of the throw!

Unfortunately, all the players in the group had some responsibility in this episode. Participants in any sport have a duty to understand the rules of that sport. Ball golfers ignorant of the rules have suffered huge financial losses for innocent rules errors and an error of this kind could have lost a tournament for a player.

How should this been scored? It doesn't appear under the rules that this was a courtesy violation, and even if it was one, there had been no warning, so strokes should not have been assessed to the violator. Our hero, "Bubba", threw out-of-bounds. That was throw number one. Out-of-bounds throws result in a one-stroke penalty (Rule 803.08)...stroke number two. The re-throw should have been considered a practice throw (Rule 803.00 B.)...throw number three. Had this episode been brought to a TD's attention after the tournament, assessing the three throws and counting all subsequent throws would have been a fair determination in my view.

Knowing the rules would have been a big help here. I keep a rulebook in my bag during tournaments and you should too. Frankly, reading them every six months or so wouldn't hurt either. And if you're going to read the rules, why not take the PDGA Official test? It doesn't cost much and it's an OPEN BOOK TEST.

Please remember that I did not witness the event related above, so if I've missed some details, don't let it cloud the analysis. Thanks to "Bubba" for an entertaining discussion, read those rulebooks and good throwin!

Answering The Challenge

The following is in response to an open challenge from the Flying Disc Drive Golf Club, host of the 2001 PDGA Am World Championship, that was printed in the program for this event. They apparently think their club is better and has done more than any other. Their challenge asked other clubs to list 1/4 the amount of people and time spent working for their club and/or course(s) as Flying Disc Drive had for the Am Worlds.

Hi, I read your article, and it sure sounds like your members put a lot of time and sweat into making your club something to be proud of. But since you've issued a challenge to other clubs to compare with yours...

First of all, I'll let you know who we are - The Sarasota Sky Pilots Disc Golf Club (SSP). We were founded in October 1994 with 10 members by Jim Widick, SSP #1. We had been working with (and sometimes against) the city and county for permission to turn a 21 acre park that had been abandoned for 25 years into a disc golf course. This included public and private meetings with government officials, petition drives, council meetings, etc. After 5 years of struggle, we finally had permission to begin work. Although we were not allowed to use power tools, we began clearing/cleaning the park of garbage, trash, mattresses, drug paraphernalia, dead trees, etc., and creating a people (disc golf) park.

Our membership grew; we became 18 after 1 year, 36 after 2, 72 after 3, 118 after 4, 203 after 5, 268 after 6, 300 after 7, and now stand at 381. We hold 3 weekly leagues, plus various "non-club" rounds and get together. We have, besides our board, numerous committees - food, competition, newsletter, maintenance, and park improvements. We schedule 6 (or more) work days per year, numerous tourneys, and a quarterly newsletter. We have also built a second course and are in the process of acquiring 35 acres from the county to build another - complete with clubhouse/pro shop and more.

When we run a tourney, we put on a festival. Players packages include a disc, mini, coupons to local shops and restaurants, etc. our lunches (feasts!) are offered both days. One of our recent events included a pig roast, fresh baked Alaskan Salmon, baked goodies, the usual salads/chips, and a chili cookoff with 8 entries. We have donated over \$15,000 worth of food, clothes, etc., over the years.

A year and a half ago, a friend from our sister club in Gainesville, died during a tournament there. By the time our members arrived home, some were already planning a memorial tournament for her family. Through the generosity of all involved, we raised over \$1300 in cash and gifts.

I know that 3,000 hours of volunteer work may sound like a lot, and it is, but I suppose that it was because only 3,000 hours were necessary. It took us, not counting the first few years of meetings, approximately 18,000 hours in volunteer time. Just this past Sunday (9/8/01), 30+ members met for a work day adding another 100+ hours.

I am very proud of our club, of my friends in the club, and to be a part of the Sky Pilots.

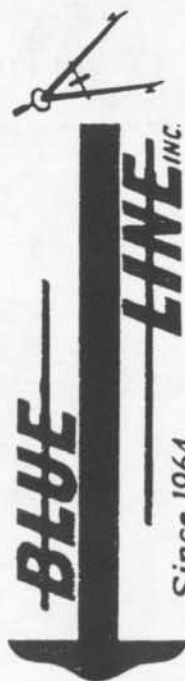

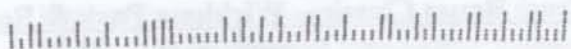

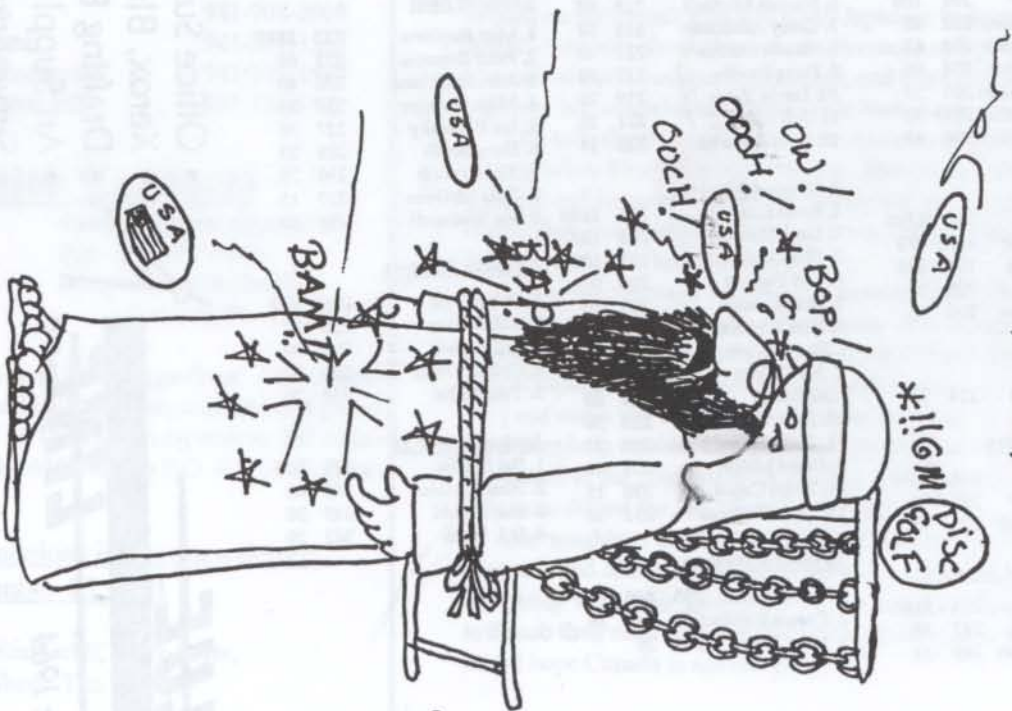
