1981 WORLD FRISBEE DISC CHAMPIONSHIPS

The following are the ground rules for the event as of August 3, 1981 - subject to carefully considered change by the head judge.

THE CONTESTANTS

The World Frisbee disc Championship is an invitational contest. Criteria for these invitations are determined by the IFA and its national affiliates.

National qualifying events are open to all players meeting the appropriate residency requirements. No other restrictions of any type, including professional status or commercial affiliation, are limits to entry.

THE CONTESTS

The event procedures are determined by the IFA in conjunction with the tournament staff. Administrative decisions are made by the tournament and event directors. In situations which directly affect the competitive situation of staff members, the staff member involved does not participate in the decision-making process. The final decision on all competitive will be made by the head official, Jim Powers.

THE SCORING SYSTEM

The overall championships will be based upon players' finishes in the 5 events.

Open:

Individual Events - The top 65 places will score with first being worth 65 points, second worth 64 and down by 1 point drops to 65th place worth 1 point.

Cooperative Events - As in the NAFDS scoring, the cooperative events will be worth roughly the same total points as the individual events with fewer places scoring points.

Women:

The top thirty places will score in each individual event with first being worth 30 points and 30th worth 1 point.

TIES

In general, ties will result in competitors sharing place and points, eg, 3-eay tie for tenth equals competitors equally sharing the total pool of points for tenth, eleventh and twelfth. Ties will be broken, however, to determine the first place finisher in any event.

If the tie exists for the overall championship in any division at the end of the competition, the competitor with the highest number of first place finishes will be declared the champion. If a tie still remains after this procedure, the competitor with the most first and second place finishes will be the champion. If the decision has still not been reached, the procedure should continue down through the places until a single champion is determined.

TIE BREAKING

The following are methods by which ties for first place in each event will be broken:

Distance - Two additional throws for each tied competitor. If the tie has not been resolved satisfactorily after the initial tie-breaking procedure, it must be repeated until the tie is broken.

Golf - Sudden death elimination beginning on the first hole of the course and continuing until the tie is broken.

Freestyle - Team with the larger number of 1st place votes wins. Still tied? Most 2nds, etc.

Self Caught Flight - The tied players will have six distinct sets of single throws in a head-to-head format.

A flip determines which player will throw MTA first, after which the order will alternate. A player is given 1 tiebreak point for each head-to-head win. Total tiebreak points determine winner. If the tie remains, additional pairs (MTA/TRC) of head-to-head contests are thrown until the

tie is broken.

NATIONAL TEAM SCORING

The team titles are based on the average score of the top three players from each national team with the women's scores being mathematically adjusted to the open point values. Only team with at least two scoring members are considered for the international competition. Awards will be made for 1st through 4th place.

SCRATCHES

Players must be at the event site prepared to compete when called. The competitive order of these calls will be posted. In the event of a player not responding to the officials call, the following procedures come into effect:

Golf - The player will be called to throw at the tee in order. If, after thirty seconds, the player has not thrown, he or she will be given a score of 6 throws for the hole. This will be done for all holes at which the player is absent for the tee call.

TRC and MTA - The player will be called with his or her group and will forfeit any attempts for which they were absent.

Distance - If a player fails to respond to the official's call, the next player in order will be called. After the next player throws, the absent player is called again. If he or she responds, he or she is allowed three attempts. If there is still no response, the player is scratched.

Freestyle - Serious scoring penalties will be assessed upon players not promptly reporting for either competition or judging duties.

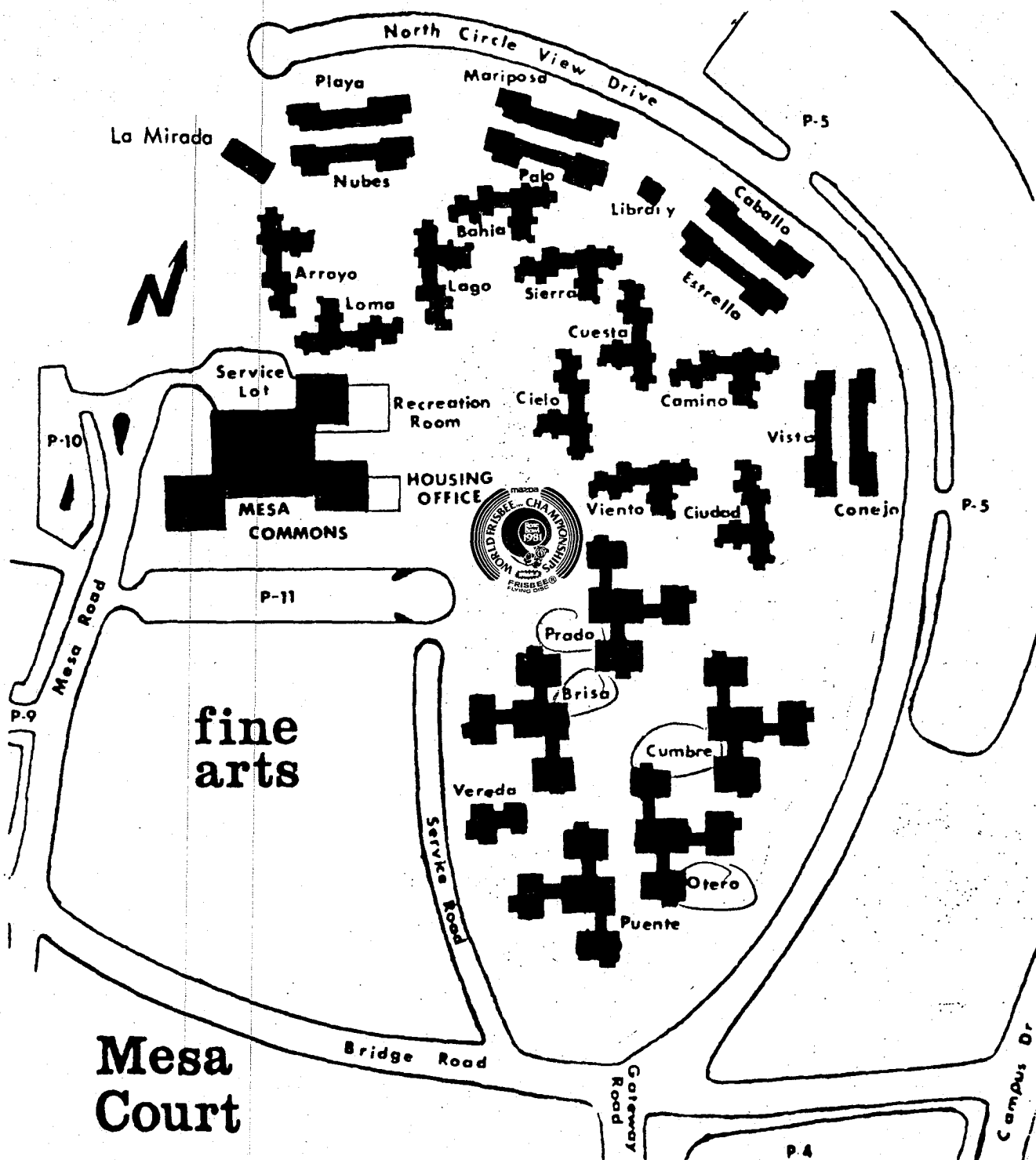
Appeals for consideration of exceptions from the above scratch rules will be accepted only under exceptional circumstances and will be considered and decided upon by the head official.

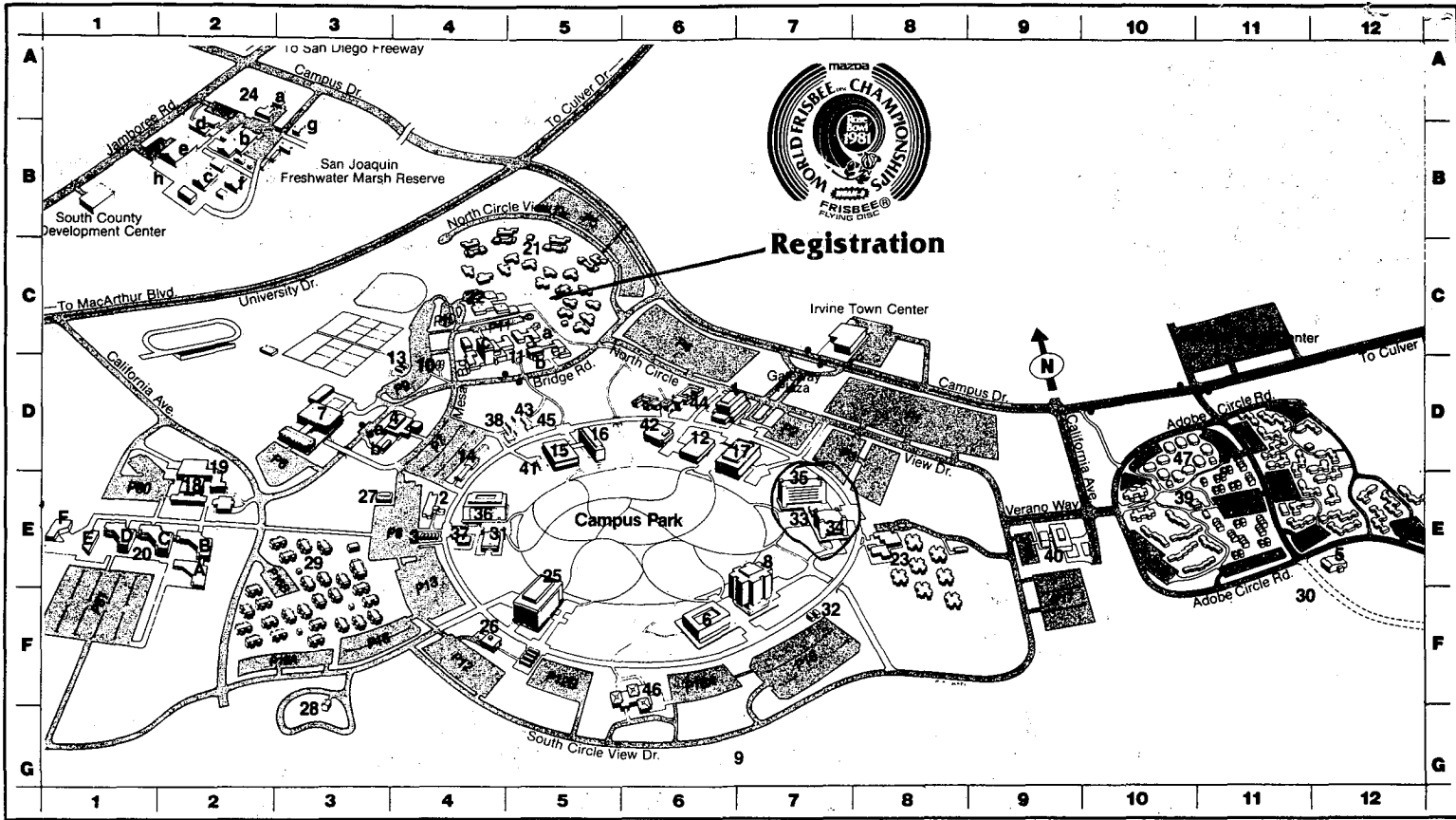
DISCS

Competition is limited to Frisbee brand flying disc models (mold and material combinations) which have been made commercially available to the public in numbers of at least 1,000. The weights of the discs may not exceed 9 grams per centimeter of diameter and may not have any post-production modifications of any type which affect flight. Any questionable cases will be considered by the head official, Jim Powers.
