Dear W.F.C. Competitor:

For the seventh year in succession, the Wham-O World Class Frisbee disc Endorsement Program will be related to the results of the WFC. We continue to believe this method to be the most fair and to provide the best stimulus for both the players and the sport.

The 1981 prize and endorsement program is much like that offered in 1980 in that there is a very broad distribution of cash awards without endorsement responsibility for the players. We will, however, also be offering what we believe are attractive endorsement opportunities to the top male and female overall finishers.

Below is the distribution system for the cash awards:

DISCATHON

Discathon is a unique event in which players must throw a disc around a circuitous course in the shortest possible time, using the fewest possible throws. The score is determined by multiplying the number of throws by the seconds elapsed.

The first competitive Discathon was run as a part of the Octad. Tom Gockle, a Rutgers Ultimate player, was the upset winner, passing John Connelly at the final turn. That race was of particular interest because all of the 150+ players competed at once. A total zoo resulted especially since only the time was being measured. Several smaller players were trampled.

A close variation of the event has been popular in Europe for several years and it is a featured part of the Big Belgian Open. They use baskets placed around the course and call it speed golf.

The event which we will contest here uses only natural objects to define the course. As can be seen by the map on the following page, the marked path includes many required passages. These are defined by mandatory obstacles which are marked with red ribbons if they must be passed on the left and with white if the path goes to the right. The runner need not pass the manditories, only the disc must do so. Conditions of passing the "doglegs" are identical to disc golf with no "unwinding" requirement.

The race begins with the first throw and ends when the disc breaks the plane of the finish line. Throws may either be caught in the air or allowed to hit the ground. Regardless, the player may take only three steps while holding the disc, prior to each throw.

Preliminary rounds are run in pairs with two players/judges accompanying in order to count throws and check for correct completion of the course.

Later rounds feature simultaneous races of 2 to 5 players. As a safety feature, players are assessed a two-throw penalty for hitting another competitor during the first half of an attempted flight. Failure to fully complete the required course results in a disqualification. One lost or irretrievable disc may be replaced per race without penalty. The replacement is carried by the observer. Out of bounds areas are played exactly as in golf, including a one-throw penalty.

Discathon presents a complex and demanding challenge. A wide range of throwing skills are required including precise curve control, strong distance and great accuracy. The running component demands speed, endurance and agility. Additionally, a carefully planned race strategy is necessary for attainment of the lowest possible scores.

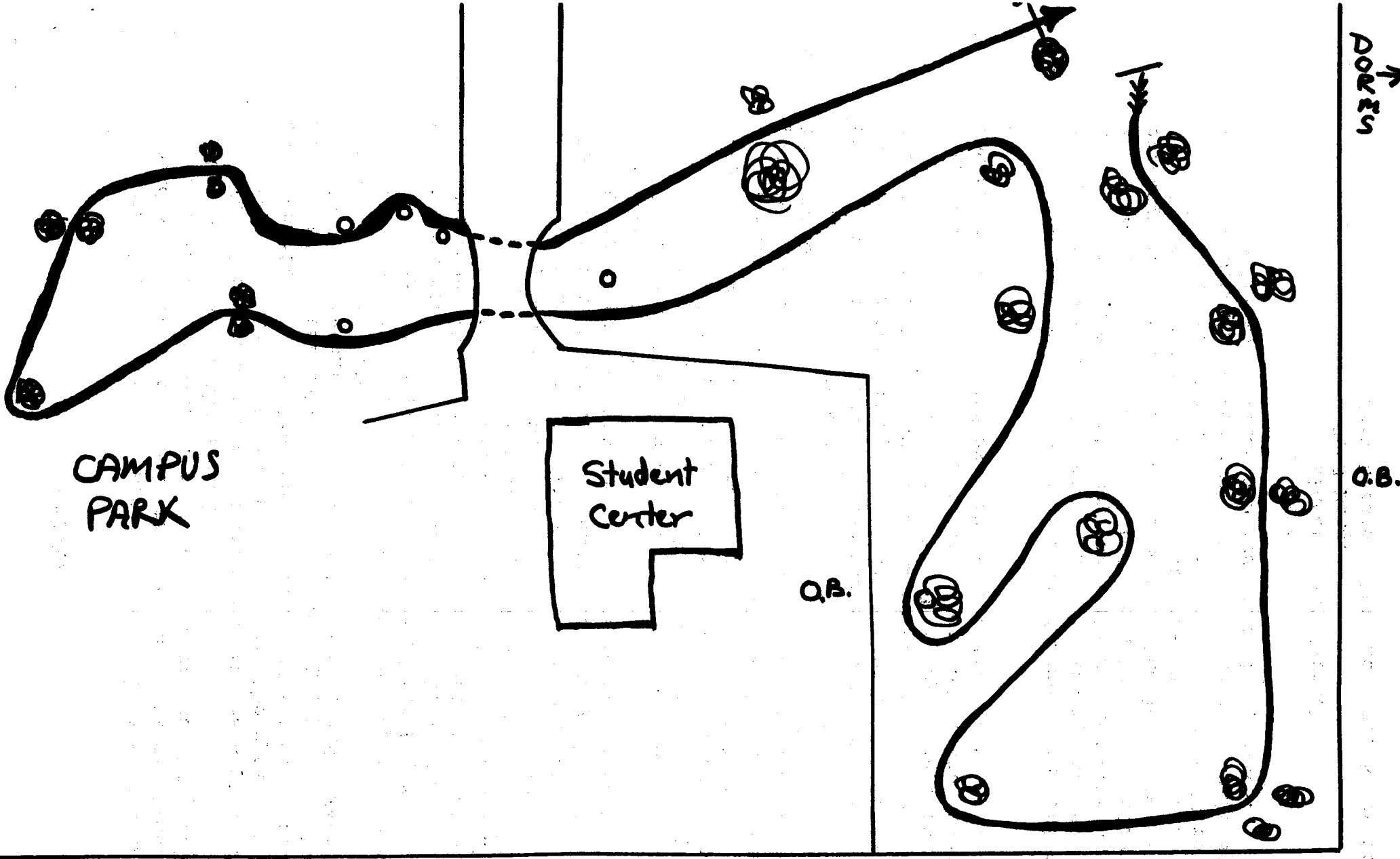

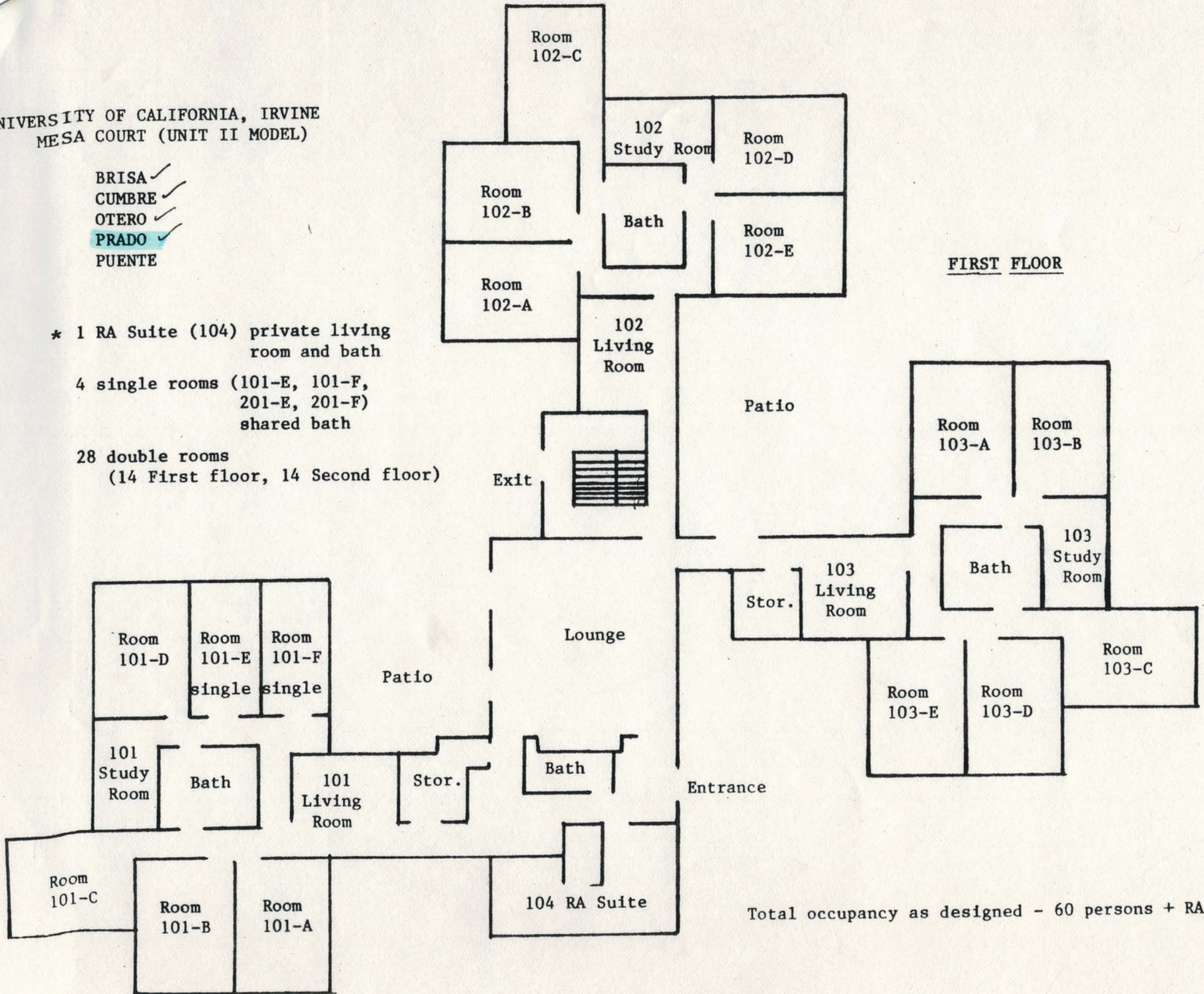

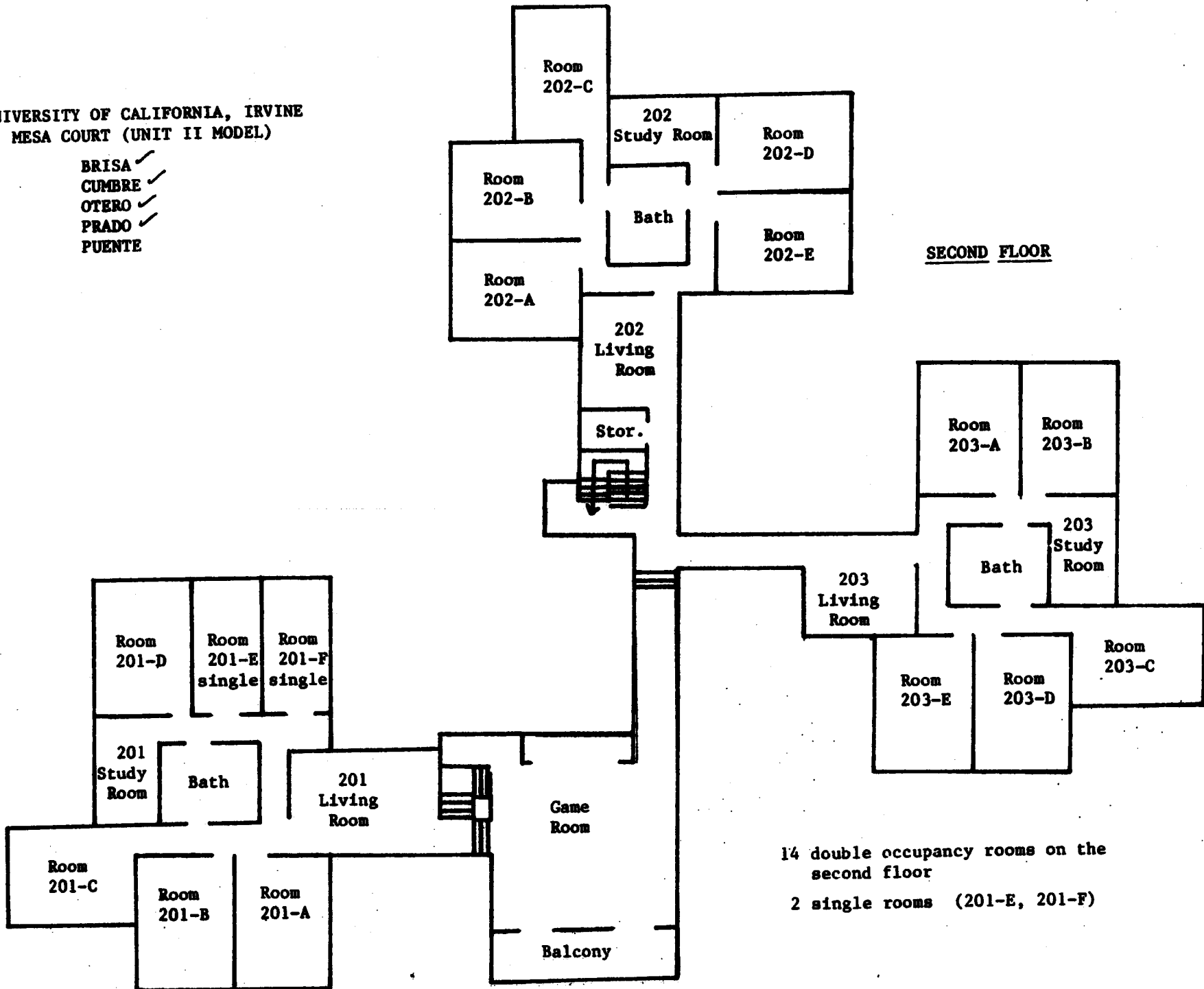
