

OPEN AND WOMEN'S GOLF FINALS

In the Open Golf Semis, Craig Hunter and Scott Zimmerman shot blistering 47's. La Mirada Open Champs Eric Marx ('79 & '81) and Dave Dunipace ('80) had 49's, and Mike Young a 50 to tie at -12, forcing a final fivesome 5 back of leader Hunter. 54 Hole leader Mike Conger faltered to a 55, and Kirkland lost valuable ground to Scott in the overall with a 56.

On the final 9 Eric Marx, with four birdies, charged past Scott, who had 2 unlucky putts, and nearly caught steady Craig. Hunter, "fastest putt in the west" on Friday, changed his putting style - no hesitation - before the semis and it worked. With only one bogey all day, and that on his 26th - next to last - hole, Craig certainly deserves his title.

In the Women's finals, Judy Horowitz lost her 2-stroke semis lead after 2 holes in the finals, rallied to tie Cynthia Allen, and then seesawed with her. Tied after 54 holes, they went to sudden life on hole 25. Cynthia Allen's approach shot luckily deflected off a lightpole and rolled closer to the hole about 18 feet away. Waiting out a gusty wind, Judy sank a 30-footer for a par. Cynthia missed her putt. And so Judy took the Women's World Golf title.

OPEN FREESTYLE SEMI - FINAL POOLS

Players picked their own pools and positions at the Pizza Ring lunch yesterday based on their finishes in the prelims. Jim Palmeri actually was eating a sandwich, happily relieved of harangues by unhappy seeds. "Why didn't we think of this years ago?" 



TRIVIA CONTEST #5
