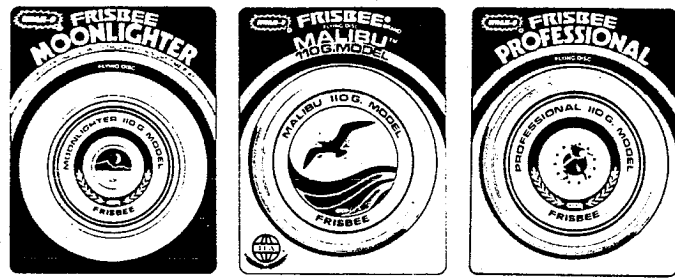

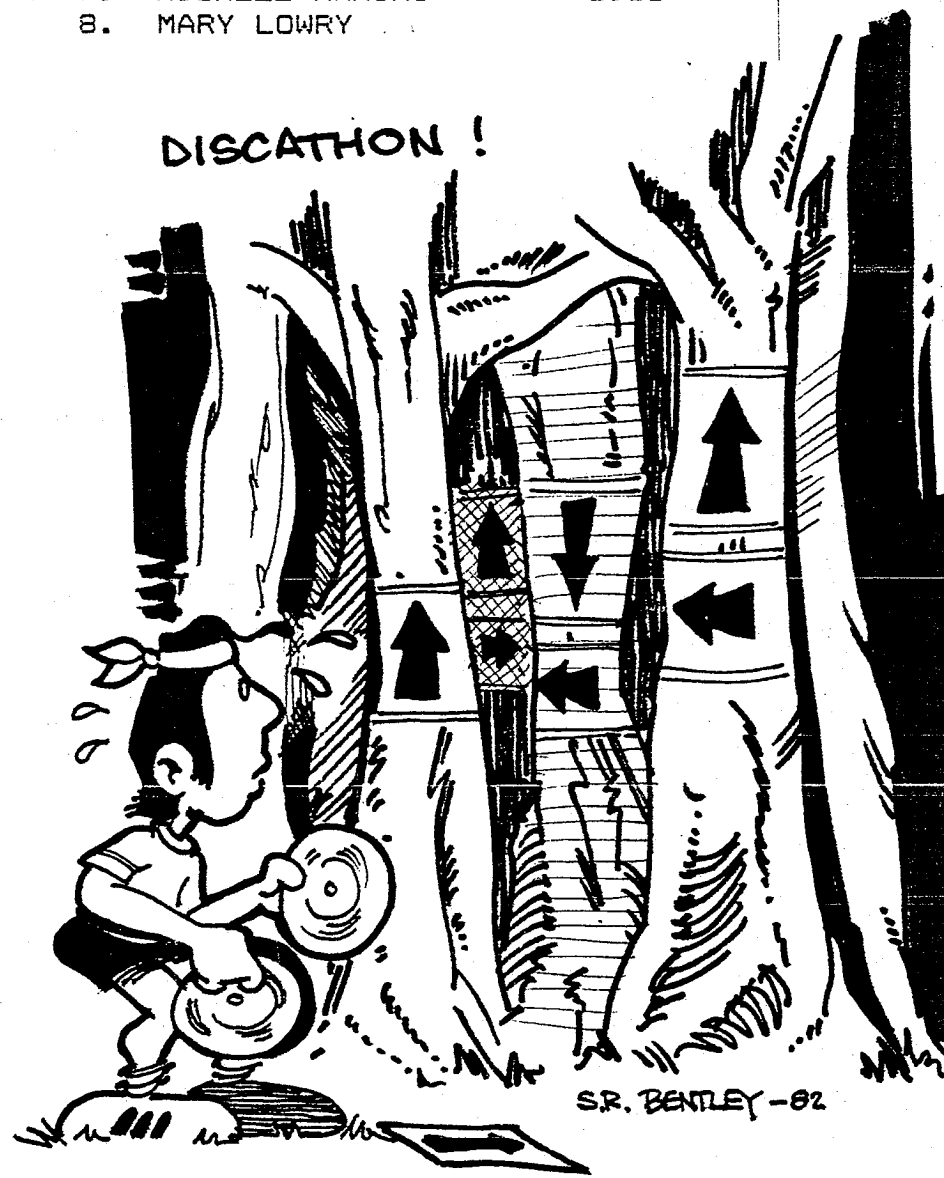

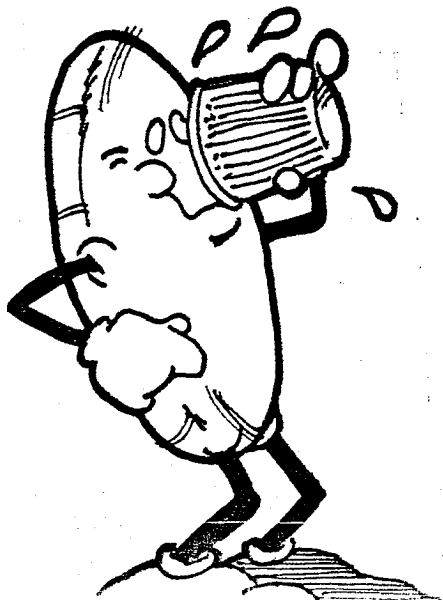

After hearing Scott's story, John realized he had gotten off lucky. Maybe next time, he'll hire a caddy.

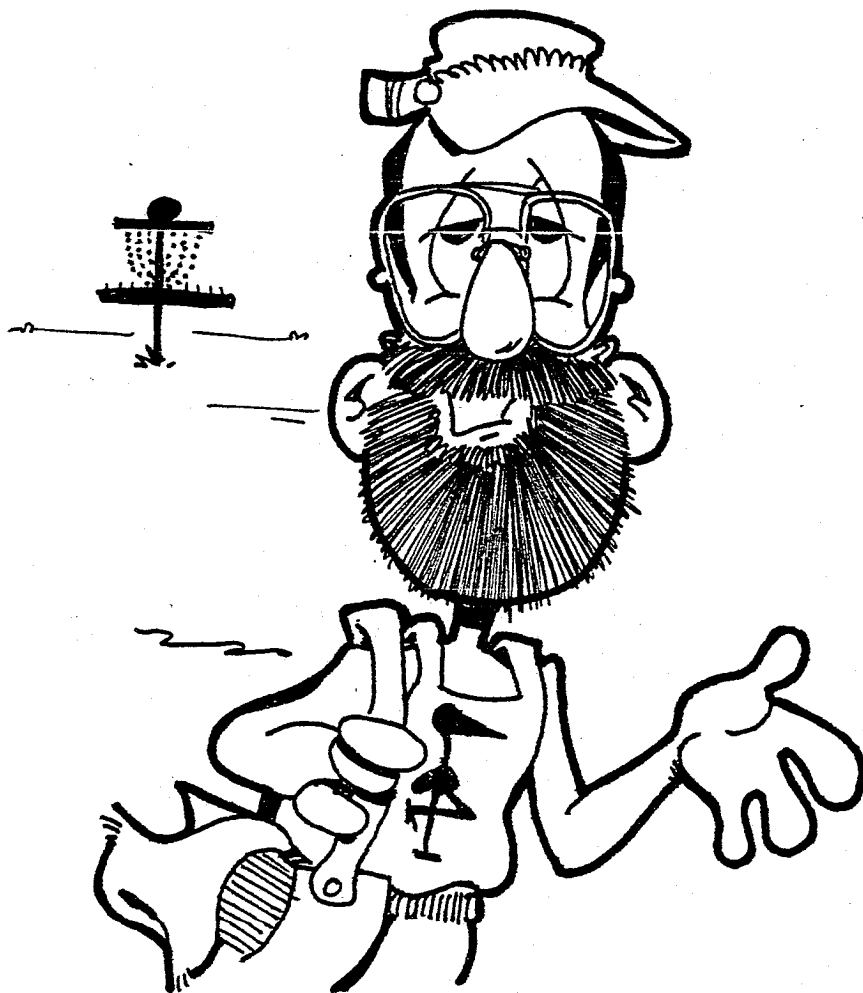


SPEAKING OF CADDIES 14-year-old Vance Galloway from Washington, D.C. is looking to caddy for someone in Disc Golf, either in competition or in practice. He will dig discs out of your bag ("The 4 disc, please"), spot their flight, and remove them from awful places like poison ivy, thorns, roofs and - for an extra big tip - from the lake at hole 15. Fees are reasonable, negotiable, and may be paid in plastic. I didn't ask if he would carry doubles. He will be on the course. And this is a real offer - and probably a bargain too, considering disc weights these days.

ANOTHER COMMANDMENT Most of you have read or heard about the Ten Commandments of Disc. Thomas Pelkowski of West Germany has discovered an 11th. Isn't it true, especially in golf, that "The more and more you get used to a disc, the greater the odds are of breaking or losing it" (cf. hole 15).

Western Europe does not yet seem to share the USA'S high level of disc consciousness, yet a devotee can usually find discs and throwers even in the wild interior of Darkest Europe, as this reporter and his wife learned on a recent bicycle trek. -9-

Adult Europeans do seem more athletic in their spare time than the average American, who is likely to be found parked in front of the tube absorbing the amored spectacle of a football clash.

But the usual medium for Europeans roadside exertions in an informal game of soccer... a thrilling, invigorating sport, which nevertheless lacks most of the aerodynamic finesse of the disc sports.

As here at home, it is among the youth of Europe, the slightly freaky, forward-looking fringe, that discs proliferate. In the parks of all the major cities lurk individuals with enough experience or karma to propel a disc in a flat curve.

A frequent source of acquaintance with disc for a European is American tourists, whom he cannot fail to meet in multitudes if he travels around Europe. Discs are a favorite artifact taken along by American travellers to remind them of home and to awe the ignorant savages.

Especially in youth hostels are they to be spied protruding from American and Canadian backpacks. As the British colonials always dressed for dinner in the steaming tropics, so must young Americans throw discs after dinner to keep up morals and digestion - - even on a Scottish moor in a 40 kilometer wind.

So even if he seeks exclusively among other Americans; a traveller can count on finding frequent disc partners of moderate ability. And better, the saucer can be a vehicle of rapport with foreign people, where language may prevent verbal communication.

Occasionally one meets a person, strange to disc who nevertheless displays such a heartbreaking aptitude for the art that one is tempted to surrender his last disc in tribute, that this soul may not miss its calling. I shunned this duty once, to my everlasting regret; soon afterward, the hoarded disc was lost in the River Shannon, doubtless to be carried by the gods back to the hand of its destined possessor.

The tragedy of this case was aggravated by the apparent absence of discs from Irish shops. Utter famine prevailed.

In most lands of Europe there are local brands of discs, plus American Imports, but they may be hard to find because of small unit merchandising. Few stores seem large enough to carry a comprehensive range of novel items, or to maintain a consistent supply of such an item.

Because of size and prevalence, Woolworth stores are a good bet. Otherwise a traveller should visit several toy and novelty stores, grimacing and gesticulating wildly if he doesn't speak the language.

Campground stores often yield results. In England one may be hounded through a dozen tobacconist shops by his obsession; this commentator finally found English discs only in Denmark.

The European disc varies. This writer has no familiarity with the indigenous Wham-O varieties, which resemble the American Wham-O regular.

Many of the European products are lop-sided knock-offs which adopt a horse-shoe

directions when thrown.

One bizzare though well-engineered model, the English Wembley, had a long downward protruberance in its center on which it could be made to bounce and spin like a top.

European models are often inexpensive (50¢ or so) and are prized by disc collectors stateside. Their varying quality and uncertain availability, however, makes it wise for a traveller to carry one or two spares of a domestic brand, which may also come in handy for barter.

THROUGH NEW BRUNSWICK WITH A DISC (1982) by Gerhardt Petz (Austria)

(Ed. note: Above was an American's view of Europe in 1974; here is a European perspective of a night in the U.S. today.) (Special thanks, Gerhard).
