In attendance was City Council member James Bennett, and P & R persons Cliff Footlick and Steve Ellis. The ceremony opened with Mr. Bennett introducing Mr. Footlick, who was instrumental in getting the course approved for Maximo Park. Mr. Footlick proceeded to recognize Brad Augsburger and Mark Meister for their tenacity and dedication to seeing this project through. I was then brought up to hand out some plaques for the dignitaries who were in attendance.

Once the awards were handed out, Mr. Bennett, Footlick, and a representative of the Pinellas Point Homeowners Association challenged the Champ (Ken Climo) to a short hole (FOR ENTERTAINMENT PURPOSES ONLY). Once they finished the hole all eyes were focused on the ribbon that was draped across the tee pad of hole number 1 for the cutting ceremony. Brad, along with Mr. Bennett, grabbed the scissors and sliced the ribbon like a CE Teebird making it's way down the fairway (well, maybe that's a bit dramatic, but it was kind of cool!). After the cutting there was a thunderous applause from the some 100 plus gallery of people who were gathered around the teepad.

Following the ceremony there was a round of doubles, or I should say triples, of which there were over 20 teams. The winning team included Bob Blair (I'm sorry, but his teammates names were unavailable) shooting an 11 under. There were several teams tied for second with 10 under taking home the cash. After the dubs, there was a good old fashion cookout (sponsored by Mark Meister) for everybody that hung around. Some CIP's were going on and everybody who was there had a great time.

It was unfortunate that Mark was not in attendance because without his generous contribution and help on the workdays this project would have taken considerably longer to achieve. No two people put more time, effort, and money into this project than Brad and Mark and I would like to take the time to thank them again for all of their dedication.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the tremendous assistance of the city crew that helped in the setting of the baskets and pouring of the teepads in order for us to be ready for the GRAND opening on November 17<sup>th</sup>. Maximo Park disc golf course is a great layout and for those of you who have not had the opportunity to play it I suggest that you take the time to play the only course in Florida that sits on the Gulf of Mexico. So bring your discs and your suntan oil and head out to Florida's newest disc golf course at Maximo Park in St. Petersburg.

Directions to Maximo Park: I-275 south to the last exit before you cross the Sunshine Skyway Bridge. Go to the bottom of the hill and turn right.

Coming from the south you would take I-75 north to I-275 north, cross over the Sunshine Skyway and take your first exit. At the bottom of the hill turn left and the park entrance is approx 1000 feet.

# Rules of the Game

Thanks to Rick Rothstein and Butch Fryer for the subject of this issue's article. If you haven't read Rick's recent First Tee column in the Fall 2001 issue of Disc Golf World News, then you need to dig it out and read it now. I was happy to see that the editor of the premiere disc golf periodical took the time to address the September 11 disaster.

I shouldn't have been surprised really. Disc Golf World News is an international publication and 9/11 affected the international community. Some of the nicest folks I have ever met were those associated with the game of disc golf and Rick relayed his similar feelings following the disaster. I'm sure that the sense of frustration and outrage expressed by Rick is mirrored in all of our hearts.

Rick's article eventually focuses on the strong community of disc golf and the flying disc sports in general. The Sarasota Sky pilots must epitomize that community. Look at us...growing like crazy and, in many ways, like one big family. You know, dysfunctional, but with good intentions. Frankly, we're the envy of every club in Florida and in many other states as well. If you were at the dedication at Maximo Park in St. Pete, you know that those other clubs are looking at us to see what we are doing right.

And what are we doing right? I think our secret is that we follow the rules. And what are these rules we're following so well? Specifically, I'm talking about Rule #803. Don't bother getting out your 1997 PDGA Rules of Play. In that issue, Rule #803 is followed by 10 1/2 pages (and 12 subsections) of instructions that are enough to befuddle anyone and likely to suck the fun out of any attempt to play the game. But if you will check out the rules at PDGA.com, you will find that Rule # 803 reads as follows: Have Fun! What a revelation! Have fun? That's what Sky Pilots do best! I'm not sure when the PDGA slipped that little addition to the rules in. I haven't found it in a printed copy of the rules yet, but there it is on the Internet, big as life...HAVE FUN!

Butch (the seer) suggested using Rule #803 as a column topic about three weeks before I got my copy of Disc Golf World News. And then I read Rick's article and there he was addressing how some Pro players need to have a little more fun...how some players

seem to take the game a little too seriously.

As usual, when I'm thinking about disc golf, I invariably think about the behavior of professional ball golfers. If you have watched many ball golf tournaments, you have witnessed someone losing thousands, sometimes hundreds of thousands of dollars by missing a short putt or blowing an approach shot or driving deep in the rough when they were sure to win with an easy drive down the middle. I have never seen a temper tantrum by a professional on a ball golf course. I've seen players take their clubs and go home...I guess they weren't having any fun. But I have not witnessed one player inflicting his bad mood caused by poor play on those around him.

I'm happy to say that in my experience, most disc golf players I have observed have displayed good sportsmanship. (Well, there was that time that a partner of mine threw his entire bag into the shool when we didn't win the play-off. Walked off, leaving me with all the second place money and his plastic scattered from basket to tee.) But most players seem to behave, and that's a good thing.

My tournament play suffers badly when my mind makes that shift from I'm having fun to I've got to make this shot. Yes, I know...my tournament play suffers because I'm in the tournament, but you get my point. Fun should be the object of playing disc golf and if it isn't fun, maybe it's time to give it a break.

So, there lies the secret of the Sky Pilots. We must have more fun than any club in existence. We have well attended leagues on two different courses, surprise night rounds and fun "club" tournaments...even our workdays are fun and well attended. And in these days of uncertainty, when our great Country is involved in a protracted war against an enemy that appears to be elusive and more evil than any villain in history, it is good that we have an opportunity to have good clean fun with good people.

It's great to be a Sky Pilot. Thanks for your friendship, for the good times we share. Go! Obey Rule #803, have more fun and good throwin!

# As I See It

# Course Clips

## The Tower Park

Another year has come and gone at NWTP, and there were quite a few changes made, although not the changes we expected. Several baskets got an alternate or improved position. The latest addition is hole #10 has 2 new tee pads that give us a 555 foot hole with it's longest pin placement (which is also new this year). We are in the process of updating all the signs to reflect the new tees and basket locations. The upcoming Springtime Open will probably see at least one more new alternate pin position and possibly another new tee pad. See our club calendar in this newsletter for a flyer on the next workday at The Tower Park.

There is a long-standing Sky Pilot tradition of "Adopting a Hole" at the course. Many of our most dedicated members did this in the early days, when the course was very rough and needed a lot of work.

Adopting a Hole means you take on the job of keeping that hole in good condition. If your hole needed some trimming done or a lot of debris piled up, you came out and cleaned it up. When the workdays came around, we generally found the adopter out on their selected hole. Now that the course is in better shape and doesn't need as much work as before, this tradition has kind of tapered off. Another factor is that we now have 2 courses to maintain, our work days get split between them, so over the year not as much work is getting done at the park. I think we need to start the "Adopt a Hole" again!

In 2002, the Springtime Open will be back-to-back weekends and we'll see the number of competitors coming in to play reach new highs. We need to get the courses in the best shape we can for this, our biggest event so far as a club. Is there a hole out there that is your favorite, or a hole that really ticks you off? Adopt it as your own and help make it a better hole. Remember there is the Lakeview course now with 18 holes to choose from. Some of the holes at NWTP that have been adopted are; #1 - Jim Widick, #3 - Tim Willis, #13 - the Lake Bros, #15 - Mark McKinney, #17 - Jeff McConnell, and I'm sure there are a few I've forgotten. Let me

know if you pick out a special hole to tackle, I'll fill you in on the ground rules and I'll have a little something just for you!

I recently got a phone call from the City Of Sarasota asking me when the Springtime Open will be held. When I asked why, I was told there was construction being planned and they wanted to be sure to halt construction while our event is going on. I was both stunned and pleased at the same time. Stunned that the park may be in the middle of the improvements we have waited so long for, and pleased that they actually checked with us for our schedule and will try to work around our event. I couldn't get anything more specific on when it all begins, but a 180-day timetable for the work to be completed by was mentioned. All we can do is hope the course is not affected too much or just as important will there be enough parking spaces for the tournaments. The best scenario for us would be if they started after our events, but for now we can only hope...

## Lakeview Park

Lakeview Park will make it's debut on the PDGA and Fabulous Florida Tours with the Allstate Amateur Championships 2002 coming March 9th & 10th. All players who attend this inaugural event will play 2 rounds at Lakeview one day and 2 rounds at NWTP the other. This challenging course will finally get a chance to test the skill and patience of disc golfers in tournament play.

The storm that came through in September really hit Lakeview hard. Several big branches and large trees came down as well as a lot of debris all over the course. Hole #6 was unplayable due to branches and a power line down near the basket. A lot of work was done just to get the course safe to play. The Parks Dept. did a great job with the clean up and a couple of workdays by the SSPDGC have it looking great again. Another workday is planned for just before the Ice Bowl to spruce it up for that event. Please come out and help us clean up the park. The more people who come out and work, the better the course will be for everyone. That's all for now, try to keep it on dry land...
