(World Jr. Frisbee® disc Championships Article)

It doesn't matter how many times you staff the World Junior Frisbee® disc Championships, it's always different. The threat of flying into hurricane Andrew was an exciting way to begin the event. Fortunately Andrew had no plans of visiting Orlando.

The first item on the event schedule is the orientation dinner. By now all the families and staff have arrived at the hotel and are busy visiting with those they've met last year or anxiously watching others, not knowing a soul. Not knowing anyone doesn't last very long here...

Dan Roddick, director of Wham-O Sports Promotion has a way of knocking down walls between people. It only takes a little while before Dan has things rolling and even the shyest laughing. But this is only the beginning.

The next morning we take everyone to Gordon Barnett park for a practice day prior to competition. We want to give everyone a fair chance to become familiar with each event and get some tips on what seems best for them. Staff for the event changes slightly from year to year trying to give everyone interested the opportunity to be part of this event. This year's staff included Mary Jorgenson, Nick Hart, Tami Pellicane, John Houck, Tom Monroe, Steve French, Danny McInnis, Dan Roddick his son Tyler and myself. It's great to work with people dedicated to the sport and interested in educating younger players. But, at the same time these younger players are educating us. Did you know that if you poke the straw through the bottom of those packaged drinks you can get all the juice and it doesn't squirt you?

Now it's Friday and everyone is a little nervous. Today we begin the competition. The morning starts with golf. Dan goes over last minute instruction and sends the staff off with their groups. It's amazing to watch these players. Some are so small you really can't believe they could throw a 320 foot tee shot. Accuracy is important at this course. There are some scary things in Florida parks. Some of the banana spiders could carry these guys away. It didn't seem to bother one of the youngest girls. She threw a drive onto the edge of a swampy stream and never broke stride going in to get it. She looked up at the staff person who was busy trying to find a stick long enough to reach it, waved the disc in the air and said, "Hey, I come from Pittsburgh and you can't let little things like that affect you". After 18 holes had been completed Aimee Reiner won it for the girls' division with 54 strokes and Ian Liddell for the boys' with 59.

MTA was a little difficult this year. A continuing light sprinkle made it a little hard to get a world record but Aimee Reiner managed an 8.52 and Karl Ross a 8.13. Jeff

Morris dropped back to catch an almost certain age group world record but fell flat on the wet grass instead. Next time...

Michael Chera from Tennessee was clocked with an approximate 10.80 but informed us that he had caught it with two hands. The spirit of the game continues.

Even though it was raining lightly during distance it didn't dampen the spirits of the competitors. They were booming out throws left and right. Michael Chera came in first for the boys with 388'1" and Aimee Reiner for the girls with 275'9". Aimee Reiner had spent some time in the past year or so being coached by Jon Freedman from L.A., it showed in this event. Amazing what a little help can do.

Now that all the events were through for the day everyone loaded in the vans and headed for Universal Studios®. Nickelodeon Studios® was our host site sponsor and has been for the last two years. They have been generous in giving us tickets for all the players, their families and staff to visit Universal. We had a great time and had fun listening to the chatter in the vans and noticing the new friendships on the way back to the hotel.

The final day. A day of mixed emotions. Competing in front of Nickelodeon Studios where crowds gather and watch and knowing that it will soon be over. The music starts and so does freestyle. Crossing your fingers and hoping they do o.k.. You can't help but get a little nervous for them, especially the little ones. Your mind is soon soothed at seeing them smile and noticing they are having a great time. We had some great freestylers this year. Tristan Anderson from Seattle, Washington had a dropless routine! A first at the Juniors. Some of these kids have made it here under the coaching of people like, Ken Folger, Mary Jorgenson, Greg Black, Richhi Ross, Geoff Hungerford, Larry Cave, Johnny Roberts and others. And it shows.

The last event, accuracy. This makes or breaks a first place rank. This year we had to play a sudden-death round in both divisions. Aimee Reiner and Allison Black were tied at 10 hits and Karl Ross and Tristan Anderson at 13. The crowd stood motionless. I couldn't look. I get too involved with these guys and it kills me to see anyone lose. Aimee Reiner placed first with 9 hits and Allison second with 6. Karl Ross placed first with 8 and Tristan Anderson second with 7. By now I was busy tallying up final scores. Everyone was trying to peek over each others shoulders to see me place ranks beside their names. Ian Liddell came in first place for the boys and Aimee Reiner swept the girls' division with first place wins in every event.

After we get back to the hotel everyone starts getting ready for the awards banquet. The final gathering of the event.

Dan Roddick starts by having folks answer some disc-related trivia questions. Unknown to Dan, John Houck is in the door way behind him, dressed to kill, scribbling down answers on what ever he can find and holding it up. Dan's thinking to himself, "Wow, what a great group, they really know the sport!" Dan threw in some humor and folks were roaring, Dan was thinking, "Boy, I'm on tonight!" Dan eventually discovered Houck's antics and everyone had a good laugh.

As folks were eating dinner Gregg Hosfeld made an appearance. He happened to be in town for a couple of days and juggled his way into the hearts of the crowd. Quite an impressive job. Gregg was being heckled by an infant, it was new to him but seemed appropriate with this group.

As dinner was ending staff began sharing memorable stories about the competitors. Some touched your heart while others had you laughing so hard you were crying. The event ended all too soon. Good-byes were exchanged with gifts and phone numbers and folks flew home the next morning.

If you've ever thought about helping someone learn to play, it never goes unrewarded. Some folks who grew up from the Juniors have gone on to win other titles. People like Sam Ferrans, Peter Bloeme, Peter Albers, Krae VanSickle, Steve Oldenberg, Steve Valencia, Jean Luc Forest, Craig Burris, and many others.
