# EDITORIAL

In the ever-expanding world of sports marketing, more and more businesses are adding sponsorships to their arsenal of weapons. Major corporations spend untold millions in this relatively new field. Something is obviously working.

Without sponsors, disc golf is going nowhere. It's incredible the difference half a dozen big sponsors can make for a tournament compared to a bare bones event where players are competing for their own money. Take a look at our stats on this issue's Calendar page and you will get an idea of how sponsorships can really make a difference.

There are some measurable benefits for those who know how to play the sponsorship game: 1. Improving the impact of your marketing message. 2. Enhancing the relavance of the brand to your target market. 3. Generating the desire to purchase the brand, or "reward" the sponsor. This is obviously ideal if someone can set up shop temporarily at tournament headquarters and sell the sponsor's merchandise,

4. Increasing brand loyalty. Disc Golf

Journal vs. DGWN. Innova vs. Discraft vs. Lightning. Are you loyal to one of these companies? Loyalty is basically sticking to a certain product in the face of other possibilities (even better possibilities). You can help achieve this through smart sponsorships.

The decision to sponsor an event is a very personal one. You and other company employees must ask yourselves, "What do we hope to gain out of doing this?" In other words, what is your company objective? Is it more sales? It could be simply increasing awareness. Maybe your sponsorship goal is reinforcement of the market position you already feel you have attained. Whatever your goal, deciding to take the plunge and sponsor an event can be scary.

Once you have decided sponsorship is for you, you need to choose your sponsorship vehicle—how big? A player or a tournament? There's no need to go all out with your first experience. Sponsor one player's entry fee for one particular event. Put up \$50 for a CTP prize. Give away some club shirts.

Donate five custom discs to the ace pot.

When it's all said and done, you should try and measure the success of your sponsorship. This can be difficult. Everyone has a different measure of success, but the one thing we can all agree on is more money is a good thing. Less money is bad. No one is in business to lose money. So, a basic starting point is to measure sales before and after an event. Don't forget to consider the intangibles though: did everyone have a better time through this sponsorship? Td's should willingly assist in the evaluation process for any sponsor.

Let's be honest: it's hard to promise a great deal to sponsors of disc gulf events. The minimum tournament directors need to do for sponsors is make sure to mention the sponsor's name numerous times, encourage participants to patronize the sponsor's business, and send a thank-you note to them after the event.

No matter what your goals—added sales, increasing and enhancing your company's image, or increasing awareness of your company's brand and image, sponsorships are an added way of acheiving your marketing goals. Evaluating your sponsorship success through a variety of ways will determine if you're on track.

Before I forget, I want to make something public: Disc Golf Journal will be making a formal bid to become the PDGA publication. I've asked at least 20 individuals if this is a good idea, and I always get, "Hey, they (DGWN) had a shot, now you should too." I guess I also feel this way, but more importantly, I feel the Journal's content is more broadbased and more appropriate for all PDGA members (amateurs and pros).

On a family note, Megan Schlueter was born on September 16th. She's heathy and about as cute as anything I've ever seen. Thanks for your cards and gifts. And a very special thank-you to Ed Headrick for Megan's personalized mini Pole Hole.

We did not intentionally omit any information. Also, the Supertour Special article covered five specific tournaments. The Wintertime Open, the World Seniors, and the World 150 Class were not part of the article-TS.

Dear Tom, with regards to Kenny's last Ken's Korner, I took exception to some of the information. Specifically, I question his advice on rotating the wrist as a means to turning the disc over. The way I look at throwing a disc is this-the hand works at a 90 degree angle to the wrist and in concert with the disc which is a planar object. If you introduce rotation to your wrist you are introducing a third dimensional rotation to a planar object which results in wobble. It doesn't come out of the hand cleanly and sperifices distance. The angle of release should be more in relation to where you release the disc the disc in relation to your shoulder. If you come from your hip, you're going to get a hyzer shot. If you come from your shoulder or higher, you're going to get the turnover. It all depends on how you release the left edge. Maybe it was just Ken's wording, but it just didn't seem right.



It's hard to believe, but Bill Wright, a mover and shaker involved in disc sports since 1977, has never been featured in a disc sports publication. Needless to say, I felt it was high time.

TS: First question: Isn't "Kiss The Sky" the name of a Jimi Hendrix album? How does that tie in with your store and the recent Aspen tournament?

Well, I'm a big 60's rock n' roll fan, but, it's not really the store theme, we're just using it in an ad. It really came about because of Aspen. You're on top of the

world with disc golf. I was listening to the song and thought: 'Wow, that's got to be the name of the tournament.' The store motto is really, the most fun wins.

TS: How did Kiss the Sky come out? I've heard a lot of good things about the event.

It was good. It was sparsely attended because it was after Worlds and Aspen is a fairly expensive place for people to go. And we put the whole thing together late in the game so there wasn't much time for promotion.

TS: I would have loved to see Stokely throw off the top of the mountain.

Tom, you would have been able to crush a shot off the mountain. That's the great thing. You can make the shot of your life at such a high altitude.

TS: Let's backtrack to how you got involved in disc sports.

I came out of high school after playing organized sports all my life. I was disgusted with my baseball coach, and thought I never wanted to be coached again. In 1976, I was starting to get into Frisbee. By 1977, I went to an NAS event in Boulder and became part of the Ultimate, golf, and freestyle crowd on campus. I met Doug Brannigan who is one of my partners. We were sitting at a Grateful Dead concert in 1978 and that's when we came up with

the Grateful Disc Club name. Doug and I went to our first big NAS tournament in the spring of 1979 at Santa Barbara and we met Rick Castiglia. We finished school and by the end of the year, the three of us were deemed the Coloradicals.

TS: When did The Wright Life open? The Coloradicals did some touring in 1979, tons of touring in 1980 and probably five months worth in 1981. These were primarily the North American Series events that culminated in the World Frisbee Championships Rose Bowl tournament in Pasadena. I opened up the store afterwards in the fall. We toured in 1980 in my Volkswagon, then in 1981 we upgraded to Rick's Volkswagon van!

There were more crowds and spectators than we could dream of at this point. It was so new and fresh that people were blown away. The sport has lost the freshness. We need to take a organizationally and in presentations to get people blown away again. We've got to give presentation of our events some glitz to take it to another level. From the beginning, the store idea was to sell more than discs, but alternative sports. We were living off of what we had saved prior to leaving, what we made on tour, and disc and tshirt sales.

TS: The WFC then became the U.S. Open which sometimes alternated with the WFDF Championships every year. But there was nothing this year. What happened?

We really wanted Sweden to do it with their Swedisc Open. We wanted that to be the WFDF Championships but they were hesitant to do it. We had several things we were trying to pull together and Aspen was the one thing that survived. It ended up being disc golf and DDC rather than an overall event. TS: I was talking to someone who was saying you were planning on a U.S. Open next year?


Yeah, next year we will host the U.S. Open and Kiss the Sky on back to back weekends. Kiss the Sky will be July 19-21 and the U.S. Open will be a five-day format like the World Seniors from the 24th to the 28th. Hopefully other people can plan their events around these.

TS: Do you think disc golf has the potential excitement that freestyle shows do?

No. People are going to get into it just like they get into ball golf. Disc golf is going to evolve like ball golf when people Golf has the potential. It's easy to understand. Eventually someone is going to come along and want to own the sport. To tag their name to it. It would be easy to do with a relatively low dollar cost. Everyone would identify the sport with that person's or company's name. All it would take would be a great marketing plan.

TS: Did the Coloradicals introduce any new techniques to freestyle?

The thing the Coloradicals did was we did our routine to a piece of popular music and had it choreographed. When we played, everybody clapped along. It was great. People were playing to music,

discover the intracacies and strategies. It's hard to picture disc golf like freestyle which is more like a dance recital or a stage show. Freestyle is more valuable in the demonstration mode than the competitive mode. Freestyle demos and halftime shows get more people to see the sport than any of the other disc sports. Do a halftime show at a Nuggets game and 10,000 people will see you. There isn't much opportunity for that exposure with ultimate or disc golf. On the other hand, freestyle will probably never be at the participation level of ultimate or golf. It's too esoteric and too difficult to play at a beginning level. Part of that is our fault for not developing an entry level place in freestyle.

TS: When did you find out about

Well, I really knew about golf all along. We had a course on campus in 1977. We threw from lightpole to lightpole. Myself and another guy got a Discraft Pole Par course put in in 1983. These were aluminum poles filled with sand. You hit below the red line and it made a thud. Above it and it rang. You'd walk around campus and hear "ding," "ding," It definitely increased the popularity from the lightpoles. We were confident that when baskets were installed it would be even more popular.

TS: Colorado has never been a hotbed of disc golf activity.

No, but I've always felt we've had the players, not the numbers? We've had really good turnouts for our CSA tournaments. We had 10 this year and pretty much pushed the max at all of them. Two of them topped 115 players. It's primarily a function of lack of courses.

TS: Do you think golf will ever take off and attract the freestyle numbers from the 70's?

but we were the first team to really choreograph to music—to enhance the routine on the music's crescendos. It became our trademark. And to this day, most teams do not put the time in that we did. We were basically frisbee hippies that practiced every day, six hours a day leading up to a tournament. There was a time when we were dominant because of the total commitment.

TS: I remember when we first debuted the magazine in 1991, Valencia and Ginnelly were on tour. I think Climo was also as well as the Three Amigos. You don't hear about disc golfers touring much anymore. I think the same thing happened in disc golf as freestyle. The money was pretty good in the beginning. Now sponsors are wondering if this is where they should be putting their money. We had Duane Utech who gave it a good push but now it's tapering a bit. But I still think there is going to be someone who is going to take disc golf on and put the big bucks into it.

TS: You've seen the best overall players that have ever come around. Who was the best?

That's easy-Scott Zimmerman.

TS: I thought you might say Scott. What is he doing these days?

I saw him at this year's World Seniers. He's doing good. He's settled down to the career and family thing, but I got the sense he might be back. And I hope he does because he's a great guy. As far as having all the talents and skills, he had it all. Certainly John Kirkland was in that group. Krae Van Sickle could have easily been in that group if he had stayed with it a bit longer.

TS: But nobody today can match Scott's overall talents?

I don't think so. Harvey Brandt has been so consistent over the years that he is right up there. But I don't know if he could ever heat Scott. It would be an interesting matchup, Scott did it for so many years—six or seven in a row.

TS: Sort of like Climo with golf.

Exactly. You don't see that kind of dominance in ball golf. It's such a head thing. Eventually someone is going to feel tweaked about it and choke. That's what blows me away about Climo. I can't imagine anyone having that kind of concentration and dedication.

#### TS: Talk more about The Wright Life.


I felt if I could bring someone into my store I could turn them on to Frisbee. And it's amazing the number of people we have been able to turn on because of that. It makes it accessible. People know where they can buy the plastic and where to find out about tournaments. Retail is a driving force in the economy and it's nice to see disc is becoming a part of that.

TS: But given the size of the sport, are there too many retailers?

Definitely. I'm assuming you are talking about the trunk operations. Skateboards were huge in the early 80's and a lot of people were selling skateboards out of their basements then. Snowboards were the same way. But the industry took a very strong stance against selling wholesale to those individuals. They want someone with a retail sales tax license and a business license because their product can be backed up. It's important to have discs in retail outlets to maintain a certain price. It's all going to wash out over time. The disc manufacturers will have so many retailers to service, they won't have time for other sellers.

#### TS: Based on sales from your store, do you see steady growth for disc golf?

Most definitely. And we are trying very hard to get more courses in the ground because that translates into sales for us. If I sat back and did nothing disc golf would grow. It's that kind of addictive



activity. You put a course in and more and more people are going to find out about it and want to play.

TS: I remember when we set this interview up you wanted to touch on some promotions you're connected with in Japan.

Right. Last year I was voted in as WFDF Chairman. I've been involved in WFDF since the first meeting at Tom Kennedy's house in 1980. The General Association for International Sports Federations (GAISF) had a major conference in Colorado Springs in 1987. I decided I should approach them to accept WFDF's application as a provisional member. GAISF is the umbrella organization for all sports federations so all olympic sports, world games, or goodwill games—any sport

that participates in these must be a member of GAISF. So being a part of that has given us some legitimacy which has always been a big thing for me.

Every year, there is a conference for GAISF and this year it is in Seoul, Korea. I was hoping to go as a representative of WFDF and ask for full membership. I'm hoping we will get voted in this October. We are also pursuing the International World Games Association as well for membership. WFDF is going to try and make more of a presence in the disc community as to what we do and what we are all about.

We are trying to do some things that are very important. If ultimate ever wants to be part of the Olympics or World Games we are going to have to be members of certain organizations. TS: Well, good luck with that, Bill.

It's going to be fun. We're going to spend two weeks in Tokyo doing clinics and demonstrations for Fumio Mooroka's Frisbee class.

#### TS: Any closing thoughts and comments?

This year the Colorado Disc Sports Association gave me the Johnny Roberts Award. This was more meaningful to me than anything else I've ever received. It's a beautiful plaque given to someone dedicated to furthering the sport. This will be an annual award. To have it come from my peers meant a ton to me. **DGJ**

# 1995 World Senior Championships July 11-15, 1995

SAN DIEGO, CA-The 1995 World Seniors Championships was arguably the most successful and well-run event of its kind in memory. Many San Diego Free Flyers, both Seniors and younger players, pitched in to make this event happen. Another impressive tradition continued as Paul Thompson's annual auction to benefit Save the Children met its goal through an evening of spirited giving and bidding.

In the Grandmasters division, it appeared to be a two-horse race between Snapper Pierson and John Kirkland, who returned to competition after a fourteen year absence. In distance, Kirkland broke the distance world record for his age group with a throw of 143.7 meters. He also broke Jim Palmeri's seven year-old MTA record, with a time of 12.26 seconds. In golf, Tom Gleason came from behind to defeat Snapper Pierson. Good work beating Snapper on his own course!

At the end, Mark Horn won his first Senior overall title, with Kirkland second and Snapper third, despite his bevy of injuries.

In Masters, Harvey Brandt, Jim Herrick, and Rick LeBeau were favored. In golf, Brandt shot a final round 10-under to hold off a strong charge by Cliff Towne. Towne aced hole #4 on the way to a second place golf finish. Brandt also took the lead in distance and discathon.

As the final day of competition dawned, the only battle in Masters was for second place. It came down to freestyle, with Herrick taking second overall, and LeBeau third.

Stancil Johnson ruled the Senior Grandmasters for the second year in a row, but newcomer Will Maxim may pose a threat in coming years.

We initiated two main sources of generating revenue: reciprocating sponsorship, where each of the five host clubs agreed to sponsor a hole at each of the other tournaments, and our merchandising campaign, where we sold over 1500 discs and returned 100% of profits to the purse.

This year, eligibility for overall prizes meant playing in three out of five events, or taking a player's three best finishes. The point system was designed to reward players who most consistently beat the most players.

The series began with the Great Northwest Open in Roseburg, Oregon. This 27-hole temporary course is certainly one of the most beautiful places to play in the world. Word about the course has filtered into Northern California, as several NorCal players made the trip. Mike Belchik coasted to a two-stroke victory over two-time defending champ Craig Gangloff to take first place. Lowell Shields took Masters after low scorer Kurt Bayne misadded his scorecard twice. Heather Witt won Womens, and Steve Officer and Tony Gideon, both from Tacoma, took Advanced and Amateur, respectively.

Event #2, Around the Park in Vancouver, suffered only in attendance. The beautiful temporary course layout at Queen Elizabeth Park is filled with variety and challenges. #### Tennessee's DoubledecaDisc September 23-24, 1995

NASHVILLE, TN-Tennessee remained the undisputed multi-event disc capital of the world as 228 players from the Southeast and beyond competed in six events in eight divisions.

Disc golf at Seven Oaks offered the usual challenges, from the varied tunnel and open shots of the permanent course to the monster temporary nine. After two rounds, 18 year-old Rivers Sherrod and Brad Hammock were tied. The playoff only took one hole, as Hammock missed his fifty-footer, leaving Sherrod with only a twenty-footer to can his first Supertour win.

Master Bob Herbert carded the best score of the first round, a 7-under, with Bob Vanderboss one stroke back and Rick Voakes and Steve Hardie rounding out the foursome. Dr. Rick's ten-under on Sunday gave him a four-stroke win over Herbert.

In Womens, Teresa Keith had a fourstroke lead after the first round. Beth Tanner charged in the final round to take a three stroke lead with three holes to play, but Keith then played her best golf of the weekend, with birdies on 340' and 350' temporary holes 2 and 3, and a 4 on the 650' monster, creating a four-stroke swing and winning by one.





First met Craig Myers about two years ago at the Kansas City Wide Open. I've crossed his path a couple of times at tourneys on the road and on the Internet. While digging through his huge pile of assorted Littleflyers at flymarts, I always found him to be an incredibly friendly and outgoing person.

What follows are the highlights of an interview done over a couple of phone calls and E-mail. Craig's sense of humor and contagious enthusiasm make him the hind of disc golfer we need representing

KT: So you're the Little Flyer guy, huh? Tell us about how you found yourself crankin' out the marker discs.

CM: Well, being in plastics, I have always wanted to own my own plastic mold. I started playing disc golf and saw a possible market to make an item for a sport I really enjoyed. I spent four to six months researching and designing a mini disc. The disc golf rule book states the specifications: this disc must be between 7 and 15 cm and height not exceeding 2.54 cm, and that is what we used to set up the prototype. A few prototypes got around, got some interest here and there, borrowed money, then BOOM! Got my own mold makin' minis.

KT: So, your first Little Flyer job was for Tom Schlueter and the DGJ? CM: Yessir!! One of the prototypes got distributed to a tournament in Illinois. received a call about delivering a thousand minis in time for the 1992 Amateur Worlds. This was June and Tom wanted them in August! Yipes!! The downpayment for the order really got the ball rolling. I was able to deliver his order - half of it in time for the tournament. Success!

KT: A question on terminology: from your viewpoint, is there a difference between a mini and a marker?

CM: Yeah, a marker doesn't blow away in a swift wind...neither does a good heavy mini, like a Little Flyer.

KT: Take us through the process of how a Little Flyer is created.

CM: From a plastics supplier, I order BB sized, clear plastic pellets in large quantities. Into those I combine some concentrated colored ones. They mix with the clear ones for the desired color. All of the pellets are melted and then squished into a cool steel mold and clamped in two halves. This process is known as injection molding. The plastic cools, the clamps separate, and the mold casting opens. The molded plastic disc falls out and the entire process is repeated over and over and over...

KT: And how do you get the art stamped on to the disc?

CM: The artwork, usually supplied by the customer, is sent to a printer who converts the drawing into a negative. The negative is then burnt into a matrix, which creates the die. The impression is created when the die stamps into a colored foil. It's the heat and pressure that embosses the foil right onto the surface of the disc.

KT: Last Christmas you sent me an evergreen scented marker. What's the deal with those smelly minis?

CM: Just something different. I try to keep up on the latest effects you can do to plastics.

KT: What other scents do you have in your smelly line?

CM: Oh, we have way too many to mention here, but some of the favorites are bubble gum, strawberry, and banana. I like the citrus smell.

KT: A lot of disc golfers play with a favorite mini. Do you have a lucky one?

CM: Nah, I have access to so many. I usually just grab one from the pile. I hate it when I go to play doubles and forget to grab one. And then I have to borrow a mini from somebody. "OK, Craig, we'll loan you one since you don't have any today." That's kind of embarrassing...

KT: I'm sure many who call you need their order "by yesterday." Do you have any good stories about rush jobs?

CM: Oh, yeah, we get a lot of rush

everyone else has to say. I try to remain casual about my opinions. Remember, I am a vendor in discland.

KT: I understand your family is also involved with disc golf and the marker disc production.

CM: Yes, it's a family affair. Lisa answers the phone and takes care of customer service. Ken and Cameron count them and are inventory control, grouping the markers in stacks of ten. Even the two year old, Caleb, who can count to three, is in on the action, handing me blanks.

KT: What do you do when you're not throwing or making discs?

CM: Playing with my kids, acting as scout leader, and consulting in plastics. Oh yeah, I forgot about my regular job, that too!

KT: What other interesting things have you done with plastic?

CM: I got involved with hot stamping squeegees. We were stamping the sponsors names and logos on the handles. These are the squeegees used to squeeze out the bubbles on decals placed on Indy

KT: Tell us about your first disc golf experience and who introduced you to the game.

CM: I was at the S & H campground in Greenfield, Indiana. My friend Scott Hommema had a golf cart. We drove around the course. It was an interesting way to learn such a fascinating game. Needless to say, I bought discs the next day from Speedy, the local disc golf guru. I learned a lot from Speedy.

KT: What do you like most about disc golf?

CM: I love playing doubles ... best shot with random partner. And I don't care if I'm paired with an am or pro. I always learn something from the pros and I hope I can share something with new players,

KT: Did you attend a lot of tourneys this year?

CM: We took in the Kansas City Wide Open, the Am Worlds in Cincinnati, and the Indy Fall Series which is five weekends for 10 tourneys.

KT: What did you think of the Am Worlds?

CM: All the events were well organized. This was our second worlds tourney. We went to California in 1994. If you compare them, California felt like going to a resort disc golf land where the kids could play in the daytime while I competed. I didn't finish in California because I wanted to see Yosemite, San Francisco, and do some whitewater rafting. I was in Heaven. In Cincinnati, I was pleasantly surprised to win the mini golf tournament. I got an amazing cut-glass trophy. I was overwhelmed by not only winning the mini event, but I FINALLY GOT A TROPHY IN DISC GOLF! Claus, Tom, Scott, and the gang put on a very smooth event.

KT: I imagine your kids probably teeth on these things.

CM: ...and the neighbor kids and dogs. The minis are in the yards, they're up on the rooftops...They're everywhere!

KT: Anything else you want to say about the future of the sport?

CM: Get involved locally. Help out the TDs. I'd like to see more new faces running events. We need more volunteers beloing out at local tourneys.

DGJ: And are we going to see Craig Myers playing pro some day?

CM: Nab, I don't really have the time it takes to play professionally. I'm having too much fun doing what I'm doing now: playin' with plastic. I'm going to be an am forever ...



turning pro—he's having too much fun!

orders. I can proudly say I've never had an order lost, or even late, thanks to good old UPS. Urs Handte ordered a couple hundred minis. He faxed a logo over, and we had his order to him in less than two weeks! Most of that time was spent in transit to Switzerland!

KT: Is there anything else you would like to plug concerning Little Flyers **Miniature Flying Discs?** 

CM: Yeah, our Little Flyers went to the New York City Toy Show last danuary. A major toy company showed off our UV minis. They change colors depending on the amount of light. It is a neat feeling attracting national attention for such a homegrown production. We also have a granite looking plastie. And two color stamping is available.

# STATE OF DISC GOLF

## Southern California

#### BY CLIFF TOWNE

the "State of Disc Golf" articles are most valuable as travel aids. Whenever I have the good fortune to visit another state, I fold the article and plane tickets into my PDGA course directory, grab my disc golf bag and head for the airport. This article will be useful to the travelling disc golfer with up-to-date data, directions to the courses, local players' phone numbers, and monthly tournament schedules.

Shall we begin with the first? In August, 1976, Ed Headrick set up the world's first pole hole course at Oak Grove Park in Pasadena. Take the 210 Rico and Doug Robinson develop their games.

Mark Horn has long been course pro, and young Chris Horn is a finalist at the 1995 World Juniors, Roger Curly has maintained the course, and has been instrumental in helping the course recover from recent vandalism.

Veterans Memorial Park in Sylmar is northwest of the Grove. Off the 210. exit on Hubbard, go uphill to a left on Eldridge, right on Sayre, and park on the left. Contact Mike Byrne (805)374-9054. Monthly 10 am on the third Saturday.

Sylmar is home of the best monthly in the area. Seventy people showed up last week as Bob "Double Ace" Dodge hit an ace between rounds in the CTP contest (\$200), and then aced his way defeated another hot L.A. player Michelle Wade at the 1995 Wintertime Open. One round of the Wintertime Open is played at Sylmar.

The Huntington Beach course is on Goldenwest. The parking lot is on the right just west of Talbert. Contact Wayne Shurts (714)847-4884 or Chris Brophy (310)588-1653. Monthly is 10 am on the first Saturday.

Huntington Beach disc golfers had to pull together to deal with the City Council earlier this

> year. They negotiated a shorter down time as the course was

temporarily moved to make way for the annual horse show. The course is back and beautiful on its bluff above the lake in Central Park. Afternoons bring healthy ocean breezes to blow away the smog and many illconsidered shots. John Ahart is king here with Bob Dodge cast as the sometimes successful rebellious knight. The cast of rebels also includes Travis Reynolds and the Rasta Surfarian crew called WTS. This course is home to the best amateur scene in So Cal with Dano Simonoff's Wednesday evening

tourneys. Do NOT attempt to play this course after rain; as poor drainage combines with the flow from nearby stables to interfere with your good

The Whittier Narrows course is in the Legg Lake portion of the park in South El Monte. Take the 60 east, exit Santa Anita, go south and then left into the parking lot before Durfee.



good shape while collecting greens fees from any and all comers. He does not charge you to play, but the buck or two you play for ends up in his pocket. The park is mostly flat and grass-covered with well established trees. A good variety of shots with some fairly long holes make this a fun course. On Thursday evenings at 5 pm, Tom runs a money round that draws a good crowd.

La Mirada Regional Park is home to the best course in the LA region. Take I-5 south to Rosecrans exit, go east a few miles into La Mirada, and then left on Adelfa past Alicante Rd, and left into parking lot. Contact Dan Mangone or Mark Molnar (714)522-2202 or Tom Pitchford (310)946-2487. Call for monthly times.

The prettiest course in Southern California has become a bit of a ghost town for the lack of a course pro. You will wonder at the lack of a PDGA yearly event here. The 27 holes go around a beautiful lake and through nice rolling hills. There are elevated tees, disc eating trees, heart-thumping OB's and some very long holes, all of the challenges necessary to produce some great players. Top guns like Randy Amann, Sam Ferrans, and Steve Valencia developed their games here. Frank Arroyo is the big gun in these parts, but a feller can't even count on the monthly taking place, much less the large-scale events that mark La Mirada's glorious past. Mangone used to run the U.S. Open Overall event as well as the PDGA's La Mirada Open. Dan is not running events anymore and Conrad Damon's effort to spank life into this course ended with his move to Palo Alto. Until somebody takes up the reins, lovely La Mirada will languish.

The Evergreen course is in Goleta on the outskirts of Santa Barbara. Take the 101 to the Glen Annie/Storke exit and go north on Calle Real (the frontage road on the east side of the freeway). Three blocks past the 7-11, go right on Branden to Evergreen. Contact Andy Schuette (805)569-2329; (805)965-0035 for info.

Instead of shooting aces at Sylmar last weekend, I was in Goleta pouring concrete with Andy Schnette and the Santa Barbarians, installing Santa Barbara's first pole hole course, Andy credits Tom(T.K.) Kennedy of the Condor Ultimate team with the design at Evergreen, I have been looking forward to this since T.K. introduced me to disc sports in 1976. While hole distances range from medium to short,

the course makes good use of the terrain to produce some challenging shots. The course begins near the tennis courts before heading down the far side of the field and encircling the encalyptus covered valley containing most of the holes. If you hook up with the locals, jump in on their Friday evening skins game at the natural object course at UCSB's heautiful seaside campus.


Waller Park is in Santa Maria (Orentt actually). Take the 101 to Santa Maria Way and go west one mile to a left on Waller Lane. Go across 135, left on Orentt, and right into park. Hole #1 is by first parking lot on right. Contact Jonathan Milder (805)937-6786 or Andy Schuette (805)965-0035.

Baskets just were installed in big (150 acres) beautiful Waller Park. Synchronicity got Andy and Jonathan together with receptive parks departments to get approval for both

this course and the Evergreen course. On weekdays, discs and maps will be available at the park office. On weekends, you can obtain maps from the hot dog vendor by hole #1.

Morley Field is in Balboa Park in San Diego. Take 1-5 to Pershing Drive exit, go about a mile to course on left past city nursery. Contact Snapper Pierson (609)280-DISC or (619)692-3607

Morley is a good, fun course with some interestingly different holes. It tenches good course management and, like Oak Grove, rewards local knowledge. If you are coming to town for one of Snapper's events, try to get a few practice rounds in. Fifty thousand times last year, someone paid a buck to play this very well-maintained course. San Diego is this decade's disc mecca, and home to the world's best freestylers, DDC players, self-caught flight fanatics, as well as hot disc golfers. Tom Gleason won Grandmasters at this year's seniors,




and Bobby Benner is headed for greatness in our sport.

Twila-Reid Park has the best of the shorter courses in the greater LA area. Take I-5 to Beach Blvd., and go south to Orange. Take a right to the park, which is a few blocks down on the left. Contact Mark or Dan at Discovering the World (714)522-2202. This 9hole course has low rolling, grassy hills. Frequent sightings of amorous couples have led local Todd Snook to call this course the "breeding ground." The single-chain baskets here call for careful putting.

An obsessive disc golf tour of Southern California would also include the following courses: Tustin (no tee signs); Fontana (missing four baskets); and Cerritos and Asuza (short with lack of interesting terrain). Cerritos is one block west of the 605, south on Studebaker, make a right just past the softball field into Liberty Park. You may find this short, well-lit course of interest if you are looking for a night game or have yet to shoot an ace. I have not yet played the courses in San Bernadino and Bakersfield. Information on these and the other courses is in the PDGA course directory.

Fall is here with winter not far behind. This is the best time of the year for disc golf in Southern California. If it is rainy or cold where you are and you get a chance to travel, put this article into your disc golf bag and come enjoy your sport in sunny Southern California. The course pro position at La Mirada is still open! **DGJ**

K-Mart and got a ball golf cart and a rack from the kitchen department. I spent about \$70, but it was quiet and efficient. I have a cooler on the bottom for all my cold drinks."

#### BOB'S MINI:

"I have one mini I am very fond of-a heavyweight Flying Eye mini. I dye a lot of my minis and discs so they are personal. A lot of people remember me because of my dyed discs. I had matching drivers and minis this at the World Championships. They had the same dve."

#### BOB'S DISCS:

2 Rams (147-149g): "The Ram is very quick so there is less room for error. These discs are the easiest in my bag to throw. I use them when I just want to set it up to the left and have the disc fall to the right. When I got into tight situations when I needed a turnover, I could count on the lightweight Rams to be perfect. This disc is so quick, but it will never get away from you. It always comes back and will be a Ram."

2 150 Class Cyclones: "These are my main drivers and I can throw these forever. My consistent distance is 400 feet. The biggest thing about the Cyclone is I can turn them over slightly and when they come back, they do so gently, they don't hook hard."

1 Roc (172g): "I use this for anything

2 Aviars (174-175): "I use Aviars in most situations under 250 feet."

2 Puppys (174g): "These are about eight or nine years old and I know them inside and out. I'll use these when I'm

180-200 feet out. If I'm closer than this I'll probably use an Aviar. A lot of it depends on the wind. I can "pop" these discs and they stay fairly straight. I like the way they can parachute in. These don't get away from you where the Aviar can slide in. I have a place in my backyard where I throw 40 approach shots to a basket and then putt out. The short game is my strongest

1 Aviar (171g): "This is a brand new putter. I bought it right before I left for Worlds. My putting is better than it's ever been. At the World Championships I went three grams lighter than I was accustomed to. I love

it. Every time it comes out of my hand, it's like ball bearings. I've tried Texans, Rattlers, Upshots-the Aviar is a straight flyer. It doesn't have to go fast to go in. One thing everybody doesn't do enough of is putting. 300 putts a day for me-

nothing less."

#### BOB'S THOUGHTS:

"You have to hustle to make things happen. You have to be motivated. I have my own business, I know. I've always felt the PDGA has been stuck in first gear. It comes down to hustle. You have to have doers in the organization."

"Just recently I've switched to 150 Class. At Port Arthur, I threw 150 Class except for my putter. When I switched to 150 Class, I felt I could throw 60% and achieve the same distance with better technique. When I came to the big holes, I could throw harder because I had more energy. If you are not using as much energy as what is in your body, your occuracy is going to go up. 150 Class just does not tug on your shoulder like heavy

quicker, but on the other hand they have more glide at the end."

"Disc golf needs to grow. The sport needs more exposure and professional disc golfers need to take the time to teach. Most pros only want to put in the time for their own practice. Look at all the movie stars and professional sports,

figures. Public exposure is what made it happen. Disc golf will grow if we put in the time for teaching others. After last year's Worlds, I did about 20 demos in a week's time and met over 3,000 kids. I couldn't get the Frisbees out of their hands once I introduced them. I was more stimulated by that than my second place finish."

One more thing. There are big differences between the Open and Masters divisions. In Masters, most uys are relaxed and play the cours I've played some of my best golf ever as a Masters player. In Open, some guys want you. They want you. It's personal, and it shouldn't be. They should be playing the course."

# BITS AND PIECES

#### New Courses

The Santa Barbara area now has a basket course in Evergreen Open Space Park in Goleta. The formal course opening is scheduled for October 23. Many thanks to Andy Schuette for making this course a reality.

There is a new course in Snellville, GA, located in Lenora Park, about 30 minutes from Atlanta.

Steve Winchester reports a 90% confirmation on the purchase of an 18-hole deluxe course for Nixon Park in Kennet Square, PA. Fifteen minutes from Delaware's beautiful Brandywine Creek State Park course, the new course at Nixon Park has terrain that would make any course designer salivate. It could be a "best in the area" course.

BOWLING GREEN, OH-New course, new tournament, new sponsor. Saturday, September 9th, 1995, ushered in the debut of the Flying Aces Disc Golf Tournament at the brand new Carter Park Disc Golf Course on the campus of Bowling Green University in Bowling Green, OH. The title sponsor was the Flying Aces Professional Frisbee Team. This was the Flying Aces first venture in sponsoring and promoting disc golf. Flying Aces is a freestyle and Hackeysack demonstration team which performs over 300 shows per year throughout the Midwest. For more information call (313) 439-8182.

Speaking of firsts, Brent Hambrick narrowly edged Gordon Holton for first place in the 30-player Open firld. Brian McGill captured first in Amateur I and Mike Carey took top prize in Amateur II

Carter Park was in immaculate condition thanks to the great support from the Bowling Green Parks and Recreation Department. The course featured 18 shiny new Mach-III's nestled in an apple orchard.

The Flying Ace himself, TD Brian Hayes, charged only \$15 for pro entries, yet paid out \$1,100 to the pro purse.

Craig Myers reports some pretty amazing golf at the Kokomo Kwaker Classic in September. Midwest Masters pro Brian Cummings shot a -21 on the 24-hole course! Craig said, "Hey, this ain't no pitch and putt course either."

On September 26, 1995, Frank Coussens III aced 410 foot hole #16 at George Wilson Park in Mishawaka, Indiana. Frank is only 16 years old!

Lanora Davidson of Tube Tone Concepts, Inc. announces they have received a U.S. Patent for their Tube Tone golf target.

Christian Voight set a mini disc world distance record of 108 meters at the Disc Golf Eurotour #8 in Weilheim, Germany 'over the weekend of September 9-10. Voight also easily won the distance competition with throws of 179 meters (prelims) and 177 meters (finals).

Some new course records reported on the internet: On Friday, September 1st, Kevin Givens shot -12 for 27 holes at De Laveaga Disc Golf Course in Santa Cruz, CA. Jeff Harper shot a -9 on Madrid, IA's Edgewood Park, a 15-hole set-up for tournaments.

Lanora Davidson of Tube Tone Concepts, Inc. conducted a survey in April-June, 1995 with the goal of finding a basic demographic profile of disc golfers throughout the world. She wanted to know how disc golfers feel about issues concerning them and their sport. Davidson focused on the electronic internet, and launched the survey in the rec.sport.disc newsgroup.

The survey consisted of 39 questions. Several questions had an area for open ended responses.

Following is a summary of the results:

The overwhelming majority (96.6%) of respondents were male. Almost three quarters of respondents were not PDGA members. More than half the respondents were in their twenties, while another third were in their thirties.

Most PDGA members have been golfing for five or more years. Most non-PDGA members have been golfing five years or less.

Most golfers live within 10 miles of their local course, and most local courses feature Mach III targets and have 18 holes.

Most PDGA members would be willing to travel more than 50 miles to play a round. Slightly less than half of non-PDGA golfers would be willing to go that distance.

The majority of golfers would not pay more than \$5 to play a course.

Only half of the golfers responding compete in tournaments. PDGA members are significantly more likely to compete in tournaments than non-PDGA golfers.

The median number of rounds played per week is 2. The median number of golf discs a golfer owns is 12, and the average golfer spends about \$50 per year on equipment.

Most golfers would like to see their local course expanded. The vast majority (94.9%) would like to see more courses in their area:

The most popular aspect of disc golf is friends and other golfers. The worst aspect of disc golf is that there are not enough courses.

Twenty-two respondents reported they were lapsed members of the PDGA. The reason most often cited for lapsed membership was forgetfulness.

Disc Golf Journal, with 45 responses, was the disc golf publication subscribed to most frequently.

The majority of non-PDGA golfers favor promoting tournaments on object courses, and over a third of PDGA members also favor tournaments on object courses.

Most respondents thought the PDGA spends too much time and money on professional golfers at the expense of "regular" golfers.

Most disc golfers reported an annual income of over \$30,000 per year, and most golfers have full time jobs.

The "World's Toughest Disc Golf Tournament" was held this September in Stockholm. Fifty-four competitors from Sweden and Denmark, including Fredrik Granasen and Martin Rosegren played a total of 180 holes on ten different courses over a three-day period.

The courses included all types of holes from open field to dense forest. The average hole length was 269 feet, and the total distance walked was 20 miles. This year, the tournament took 36 hours to complete.

Granasen took the title, and Richard Kappling was 15 strokes behind in second place.

The Swedish golfers would like to see more foreign players next year. For more information on this event, contact TD Patrik Wikstrom, Solhemsvagen 23, S-137 40 Vasterhaninge, Sweden. His e-mail address' is patrik.wikstrom@net support.telia.se.

Next year's tournament will be June 28-20, 1996; any foreign entries must be submitted by May 1, 1996. The entry fee is \$25, only 14 cents per hole!

The 1996 Pro Worlds will be in South Bend, Indiana the first week of August. Mixed pairs will be on August 4th, doubles on August 5th, and singles competition from August 6-10. Tournament Director Norm Hezlep is excited about the possibility of ESPN 2 filming some of the week's action.

Terry Rester of Mobile, Alabama informed Disc Golf Journal that the Mobile disc golf club is putting in a formal bid to the PDGA for the 1996 Amateur Worlds.

Several Wisconsin disc golf clubs, including Madison, Sheboygan, Appleton, and Milwaukee are teaming up to bid for the 1997 Amateur Worlds. The tournament site will most likely be Appleton, with Joe Weinshel as tournament director of this collaborative effort.

#### Par for the Course

#### Disc Golf is a great way to revitalize vandalized and underutilized

#### BY SUE SCHMID

t's hard to believe that throwing a disc around a course lined with baskets would draw throngs of people to parks everywhere, but when you consider the game has many similarities to the overwhelmingly popular sport of golf, maybe it's not so unusual.

The goal of the sport called disc golf is the same as that of regular golf: to complete the course in the fewest number of throws (called "strokes" by aficionados) as possible. To play, users toss a specially made golf disc (much like a Frisbee®) into elevated metal baskets suspended from chains designed to help knock the discs in. Players compete on either a nine or 18-

Currently there are more than 400 courses scattered around the country, with Illinois and Indiana the current disc golf hot spots.

"Once you put a course in, it becomes so popular that adjoining areas start popping them up," says Don (Duster) Hoffman of Blue Mounds, Wis., the midwest regional coordinator of the Professional Disc Golf Association (PDGA). "It's spread more by word-of-mouth than anything."

A majority of the courses are located in city, county, or state parks. A few are also located on college campuses and military bases, and some are privately owned and operated. Most courses are free, although some are pay-to-play, charging \$1 to \$2 either for admission or the rental of a disc.

Baton Rouge, La. is one city that has found disc golf profitable. The park system has two 18-basket courses, both of which are free to the public, but both of which share pro shop space with adjoining tennis centers.

"The tennis pro shop has given us part of their area and we sell discs, bags, and T-shirts from there," says Debbie Spica, recreation specialist with the Baton Rouge Recreation Commission. "We're doing great with that. We easily make a lot more money that it takes to run both of the courses.'

Disc sales are particularly strong. Spica orders 300 to 350 discs every two or three weeks to keep up with demand. "No sport shops push disc golf sales, so we pretty much have a monopoly on it," she says.

Besides being popular and profitable, disc golf is also an ideal

way to develop parks that are underutilized and prone to vandalism.

"A lot of times you'll have vandalism or the undesirables will hang around," Hoffman says. "One of our best calling cards is that you can put a disc golf course in and with the sheer numbers of people who start playing and frequenting the park, these people find other places to do their thing. That's been one of the great testimonials we've gotten from parks departments around the country."

That was the case at Elver Park in Madison, Wis., where Hoffman is the course pro, a volunteer position. Vandals used to steal signs from the course, but now that the course has become more popular, Hoffman says the number of people walking through has eliminated the vandals.

Hoffman says the current cost of a course ranges from \$10,500 to \$12,000 for an 18-hole course and from \$5,000 to \$6,200 for a nine-hole course.

"It's very cost-effective for parks departments," he says. Spica says the key to putting up a disc golf course is to get local clubs involved.

"They're the ones that came to us. We had two or three individuals who really took the load off of us by saying that if you give us a course, we'll help keep it up. They program for us, so you don't have to worry about that extra staff. All we have to do is keep the grass cut and the trees trimmed," she says.

The PDGA is currently working on guidelines for course design and has set up a design committee that will meet at the upcoming world championships.

"What we're trying to do is design courses with the recreational golfer in mind that will be less than 4,000 feet in total length," says Hoffman, who envisions two or three tee placements on the same course, with varying course lengths for recreational, amateur, and professional players.

"In the past, whoever went to the park department and pitched them on the idea of putting in a course designed the course," says Hoffman. "What happens is that the person who pitches the course is a professional player and too often, all he or she can see is a 6,000 or 7,000 foot course.

"That's not the way to go for recreational entities, though," Hoffman says. "What we've realized is that if you put in a shorter course, it's more popular."



## The Disc Golf Hall of Fame

for years, I have always wanted disc golf to have its own Hall of Fame. Frisbee had its own Hall of Fame but not disc golf. For quite awhile I tried to get others interested in starting a Disc Golf Hall of Fame but nobody seemed interested in doing the work. I decided to take it upon myself and surprise everyone at the 1993 PDGA World Championships with the inaugural inductees. This article is a tribute to the current 19 members with a short description of each person's accomplishments. Incidentally, the year I discovered the secret Board nominated me, I took no part in the voting. I was a bit embarrassed and also very honored to become a member.

CHAMBERS, VANESSA—Vanessa Chambers' excellence in disc golf has elevated both the visibility of the Women's division and the standard by which it is judged. She has been named Woman Disc Golfer of the Year three

times, has won the PDGA World Championships twice, and has compiled a phenomenal record of top-place finishes.

CLIMO, KEN-With six straight World Championships and counting, Ken "The King" Climo reigns the disc golf world with a staggering number of tournament wins. Always ranked in the top five, Ken works as diligently to develop the sport for others as he does to perfect his own game. Friendly and energetic, Ken's a constant influence to new players, and actively pursues the development of new courses in his home state of Florida. To watch the power, precision, and grace of Ken Climo in action is to understand why he is perhaps the best disc golfer to ever play the

DAVID, JOHN—As one of disc golf's most successful entrepreneurs, John David has introduced thousands to the

flying disc. A true disc golf professional, John has designed 30 courses, installed 10, and directed countless tournaments, including Atlanta's long-running Tournament of Champions. John's expertise has successfully guided his disc related business ventures, most notably the Identified Flying Objects retail store. John's disc golf skills are evidenced by numerous PDGA wins and titles, including Masters Doubles World Champion (1985 & 86); Grandmasters Doubles Champion (1992 & 1993); the Headrick Cup (Disc Golfer of the Year); and the Jim Olsen, Sr. Award (Senior Disc Golfer of the Year).

DUNIPACE, DAVE—A world-class competitor and coach of champions, Dave Dunipace engineered advances in disc technology that hurtled disc golf into the space age. Thanks to Dave's ingenuity and innovation in flying disc design, today's disc golfers are able to throw the shots of their dreams.

DUVALL, HAROLD—A two-time world champion, Harold is a true gentleman on and off the course. An interesting sidebar is the first PDGA World Championships held in 1982 was Harold's first disc golf-only event. And he won! He has worked diligently to expand the scope and recognition of the sport, and is an experienced course developer, teacher, and TD. Duvall's work with Innova-Champion helped the development of flying disc technology. He personifies the notion of giving back to a sport from which we all receive so much.

GREENWELL, DAVID—A true professional with unmatched credentials as a competitor, David Greenwell ranks high above the crowd in number of wins, winning percentage, cash winnings, and miles traveled in pursuit of disc golf tournaments. Named the PDGA Player of the Year three times, David is the 1993 Masters World Champion and has won four Doubles World Championships. Whether he's organizing events at the local level or showcasing his skills overseas, David's light-hearted good nature has gained him recognition as a respected ambassador of disc golf.

HEADRICK, ED—A true disc golf immortal, "Steady Ed" Headrick has always been the sport's greatest ambassador. Among his many contributions to flying disc sports, Ed's invention of the Disc Pole Hole consummated the design of disc golf. A tireless inventor, Ed is also credited with the invention of the Wham-O Frisbee, the Superball, boat hydrofoils, and ocean-going oil skimming devices. Ed's impact on our culture is outweighed only by his own love for the flying disc.

KOBAYASHI, NOBUYA—The mastermind behind the Japan Open and the driving force behind Japanese disc golf, Nobuya is perhaps the sport's most professional emissary. He is one of Japan's most highly regarded sports writers and authors. The harmonious teams Japan sends to the Worlds each year are a tribute to Nobuya's emphasis on the spiritual virtues of friendship and harmony disc golf offers. His wife Keiko is the first Japanese Ultimate player and disc golfer. Nobuya's daughter, Lisa, is a JPDGA Junior Disc Golf Champion.

LYNN, DARRELL—Darrell dedicated himself to the progression of disc golf as PDGA Administrator from 1986-1993. Darrell shouldered critical responsibilities and ensured the integrity of the PDGA. The early proliferation of professional disc golf would not be possible without his perseverance and sacrifices.

MANGONE, DAN — After directing and promoting the La Mirada Open for 13 years and the U.S. Open for eight years, Dan helped set the standard for tournament directing. His work at California's LaMirada Park helped cultivate many of the world's best players, including Sam Ferrans and Steve Valencia. He continues to serve the disc golf community through his Discovering The World business.

MONROE, TOM—Tom has won numerous World Championships and countless tournament titles, and is one of disc sports' all-time great players. As a touring competitor, traveling demonstrator, businessman, promoter, and teacher, Tom has touched the world and spread the joy of disc golf everywhere.

NEWLAND, DOUG—A spirited pioneer of disc golf in the northwestern United States, Doug's unbounded enthusiasm subdued the doubts of parks officials. He helped forge the idea of a players organization, and as PDGA #016, worked hard to advance the sport until his untimely death in 1989. Doug had a very strong interest in K-9 Frisbee competition and in 1978, won the World Championships with his dog Luxor. Doug's legacy as a competitor, instructor, and promoter will be outshined only by the memory of his passion for enjoying life.

PALMERI, JIM—Jim Palmeri's pivotal work in the early 1970's helped launch disc golf as a competitive sport. His personal sacrifice made possible many marvelous events, including the 1974 American Flying Disc Open and the 1984 PDGA World Championships. Jim's knowledge of the flying disc is positively encyclopedic.

PIERSON, LEO "SNAPPER" -As full-time course pro at San Diego's. Morley Field, Snapper's life is dedicated to the sport he loves. He has attracted legions of new players and has elevated disc golf's image. A fierce competitor, Snapper has earned numerous titles, including seven world championships. He has always aggressively strived to be disc golf's best. In fact, Snapper's statement of personal philosophy best sums it up: "I once heard John Kirkland say that there is first place and then there is the rest of the world. Each individual should strive to live up to their ultimate potential in life. Through this struggle they are striving to be number one."

ROBERTS, JOHHNY (1931-1994)— Gentle, fair and friendly, Johnny

Roberts embodied the joyous spirit of disc golf. His lifelong custom of warmly embracing everyone he met earned him the affectionate title of "Sqeezer Geezer." Though he held several Grandmasters and Senior Grandmasters titles and records, Johnny always downplayed the importance of winning and instead focused on having fun. He preferred to compete with people, not against them. Some of Johnny's many interests were anthropology, Star Trek, and solar eclipse observations. A teacher throughout his life, he taught us to enjoy the game and love others. Johnny Roberts literally hugged the world, and in doing so forever warmed the heart of disc golf.

RODDICK, DAN—Through his association with Wham-O, his seminal work on the rules of disc golf, and decades of dispensing advice and expertise, Dan "Stork" Roddick has touched the lives of

thousands in the flying disc world. As a disc golf player, sportsman, promoter, and leader, Dan always exhibits the positive attitude of a winner.

SMETHERS, TED—Ted Smethers has distinguished himself as a leader in professional disc golf. As commissioner of the PDGA from 1984-88, Ted's perseverance and insight were instrumental in creating the framework from which the PDGA now functions. Today's system of scheduling tournaments evolved from Ted's coordination of the Pro Tour in its early years.

VOAKES, RICK—A successful Bowling Green pediatrician, Dr. Rick Voakes somehow finds time to excel both as a competitor and executive in the world of

WOLFE, LAVONE—With a 25% winning percentage over 20 years, Lavone has won over 40 disc golf titles. He is recognized for his unwavering



character, and was awarded the Bob West Sportsmanship Award in 1989. His influence is widespread as a teacher, director, promoter, and supporter of disc golf. His commitment to running high-caliber tournaments, including two PDGA World Championships, have helped set standards for disc golf to follow.

# 1995 PDGA World Championships

nly once in the history of the PDGA Pro World Championships had one city hosted the event for the second time. That was in 1993, when the world's top players headed for Huntsville, Alabama. A lot had changed since the first Huntsville Worlds in 1983. This year, Port Arthur, Texas became the first city to host disc golf's premier competitive event in consecutive years. What changed this time?

The courses hadn't really changed, except in places where giant tankers coming through the ship channel had worn away the shoreline or where efforts to slow erosion had left immovable slabs of concrete next to the course. Players who had struggled in

Rick Voakes, a newcomer to the Grandmasters ranks. Master Women's champ Sharon Jenkins was also a noshow, adding to the odds we would have several new champions this year.

#### Open

With all the amazing Open players these days, it's easy to think of a dozen who could have won this event without surprising anyone. Two younger players, California's Frankie Arroyo and Sweden's Svante Eriksson, are now legitimate stars after finishing in the top six. Bamba Rico wasn't far behind. Joe Mela and Mike Sayre showed us we should expect them to be in contention year after year, along with Mike Moser, Brad Hammock, John Ahart, Fredrik Granasen, Tomas Ekstrom, Mitch McClellan, Steve Valencia...what a list!

Sam Grizzaffi, who has come closer

to taking the title from Climo than anyone, made his Worlds first appearance years and proved he can still be a factor. Crazy John Brooks added to amazing resume of top five finishes at Worlds; except for Climo. he is far and away most consistently excellent Open player at this tournament.


The week's notable most rounds were by John Ahart, who blistered Ponderosa with a 12-under, three better than the course record, and Mike Randolph, who unconscious during the 9-hole final round. getting within five strokes of the lead Saturday morning, Mike fell back to nine down going into the final. His 22 for the final

nine was five strokes better than the

field's! There was even a moment when the whole deal was in doubt. Climo's drive on #11 at Circle R landed on top of an old maintenance shed. He took a stroke for OB and had to take a lie inside the shed. With debris at his feet and a narrow door, he might have taken two shots just to get out, and two more to get up the hill and into the basket. But Climo quickly sized up the shot and threw a roller out the door. The roller made its way up the hill and flipped over, resting calmly within putting range. With two holes remaining, there was no longer any doubt. I think that's six in a row now.

#### Pro Women

Without Elaine, the women's field was wide open, but four favorites stood out: Kelli Hughes, Becky Powell, Teresa Keith, and Anni Kreml, one of the all-time greats who finally decided to come to the World Championships. By mid-week, it was looking like a shootout between Becky and Anni, and when the players teed up for the finals, Kelli and Teresa had strong locks on third and fourth, respectively. Anni started the finals with a one-stroke lead and began to pull away when Becky's drive on Ponderosa #6 was



called OB. But Becky got three strokes

back on the next hole,

York City."

What had looked to be the closest race was over in a hurry. Bob Vanderboss, who had lost the title in sudden death last year, was not to be denied. By Thursday, his lead had grown to six, and the likes of Stan McDaniel, Eric David Marx, Greenwell, and Lavone Wolfe just

couldn't get close. The final margin was a very convincing 16 strokes.

Rookie Master Beth Tanner managed an even greater margin over Andi Lehmann and Sylvia Voakes, whose husband was beaten in only one round all week. The amazing Dr. Rick put an end to Monroe's streak, with Mike Conger and Royce Racinowski once again rounding out the top group.

Another rookie, "Wet Willie" Maxham was impressive in his pursuit of Ralph Williamson in the Senior Grandmasters division. But Ralph just had too much-this time. Robert Baum took the last money spot, followed by Harry Bowerman.

#### 150 Class

This year, 92 players stuck around an extra day to play in the second annual World 150 Class Championships. With Mattel Sports putting up the cash for prize money, trophies, and staff support, the payout was over \$4500.

To understand the real challenge of this event, keep in mind that many players were near exhaustion after a grueling week in the heat, and while more and more players keep 150g discs in their bag, virtually everyone had not had a chance to practice with these discs. Several players were throwing

The Bahama Beach Club hadn't changed. The lunch break was longer, giving players a chance to relax and swim between rounds. Unfortunately, there wasn't much chance the weather would be better. There was no repeat of last year's unseasonably cool days. It got downright toasty, and some days included rain. 150g class for the first time.

Ken Climo never seems to get tired, and he doesn't seem to care how heavy his discs are. As he had dominated the 150 Class Japan Open, he opened up with a 41 at Berry's Treasure. That's the same score he posted during the week with heavy plastic. Meanwhile, Brad Hammock, a newcomer to 150 play, birdied 8 out of the first 13 holes. His eyes and smile were bigger than usual when he said, "Man, I can't believe how nice this baby flies. Yeah, I'm havin' fun!" His 47 put him in a tie for second with Dean Tannock and John Ahart. Gregg Hosfeld led Masters

with a 46, eight strokes better than his best weekday effort at Berry's. Becky Powell took a two-stroke lead over Anni Kreml with a 51, while Bruce Sisson and Royce Racinowski led Grandmasters with 53.

Everyone moved to Kisselpoo for the afternoon round. Ahart shot a smokin' 46, finishing two behind Climo. Tannock shot a 50 to take third place, followed by Matt LaCourte and Eric Marx. The yictory was worth another \$500 for Climo.

Once again, the big excitement was with the women. Kreml's round of 59 tied Powell, and they headed to Hole #1

for a playoff. Anni had to be happy knowing there's no water at Kisselpoo, and when she hit one of the only birdies of the day on #2, she was finally a champion. Beth Tanner and Teresa Keith took the last two money spots.

Sisson's 56 was good for a 2-stroke victory over Ban Tow, who plays a lot of 150 golf at home in Japan. Racinowski and Ed Morgan got the last of the Grandmaster cash. Hosfeld's 50 left him two strokes ahead of Bob Vanderboss, Stan McDaniel, and Roger Bunting. Wet Willie Maxham, the lone Senior Grandmaster hungry for more golf, took honors for that division.

It was a learning experience for many players, and we can expect to see continued increase in the use of 150 class plastic at all levels of play. The big question is whether anyone can create a class of play Ken Climo won't dominate. Look for a possible Vintage Class World Championships in South Bend next year, and look for me to put my money on the same guy.

Millennium Discs' Aurora MS 1.1 Company: Millennium Discs (803) 366-5028 Specs: 21.7cm—180g limit

Who is Millennium Discs? Millennium is a company formed a few months ago by John Houck and Harold Duvall. Duvall, as most of you probably know, is also a partner in Innova-Champion Discs.

Ever since Discraft's Cyclone came out, Innova-Champion Discs has tried to find a similar material for their discs. Innova's Dave Dunipace claims the Millennium plastic is the same as Cyclone plastic but a different shore, or hardness. Discraft's Jim Kenner said it is not the same plastic. It really doesn't matter. Millennium Discs has successfully found a super durable material for a new line of mid-range discs, long distance discs, and putters.

The Aurora is not a standard Innova mold, but you can throw it into the DGA Pro Driver/Roc/Shark family. The MS in the disc name stands for mid-range stable or straight driver. The 1.1 refers to the first mold configuration and the first run.

Now, we have to be honest. When we first held the Aurora and pressed down on the flight plate we weren't impressed. It just didn't feel durable. Boy, were we wrong. The Aurora survived our stringent durability tests that would have trashed standard Innova discs. We drove over our samples and threw them against chain backstops and the discs came out looking pretty good. But, just like any other disc if you beat it up a bit it will fly flatter. With an Aurora, it will take a lot more time to get to that point.

The Aurora's flight is probably most similar to a Shark—a long, straight, true-flying disc capable of holding hyzer and anhyzer shots equally well. However, in windy situations, the Aurora is less predictable. Several players, including Mike Sayre and Becky Powell, as well as our own staff, agreed with this.

The Aurora is a good solid disc that is certainly userfriendly, but this new Millennium plastic comes with a hefty price tag: approximately \$2.00 more per disc retail. That's a lot. Player demand will determine the future of Millennium discs. 1995 PDGA Disc Golf Course Directory Company: Professional Disc Golf Association (817) 594-3727

The main criticism we had of last year's PDGA Disc Golf Course Directory was the lack of current updated information. Each listing is dated to whenever the last update is provided to Course Directory editor Steve Hartwell. Some of the information in last year's directory had not been updated in five or six years. The oldest updates in the new directory are from 1994, so everything is nice and current. The word is definitely getting out and course pros are realizing the value of this product. Hartwell constantly receives phone calls and letters with updated information.

Our Managing Editor, Kathy Ignowski, was excited when the new directory came and immediately started planning the 1996 Disc Golf Journal vacation. With the recent birth of Tom and Kathy's baby girl, the Journal staff had to forego this fun and informative annual expedition this year. Next year, we plan on playing and reviewing another 30-40 courses using the Course Directory as our guide.

As we mentioned in our review of last year's Course, Directory, the annual PDGA Directory is one the most valuable tools available to all disc golf enthusiasts—players, promoters, and parks personnel alike. A comprehensive listing of all courses worldwide is indispensible. The Journal gets calls all the time from individuals wanting to know course information, and the PDGA Course Directory is where we turn. It is THE source.

Hartwell is constantly improving the directory. This year's state maps following the course listings are less cluttered. The new directories are also very durable with their stiff covered spiral binding. Hartwell also did a nice end piece to the directory with a graph showing the number of courses installed over the years.

Eventually, Hartwell plans on using his mapping software to create a multi-color U.S. map with all the courses identified. This would be a great resource for the PDGA.

Vortex (with Cyclone plustic) Company: Discraft, Inc. (810) 624-2250 Specs: 21.1 cm 178g weight limit

Overall rating: \*\*\*

When the Vortex was introduced in 1989, it was a radically new concept—a smaller disc more overstable than anything on the market. Incredibly, the Vortex has remained unchanged for six years.

The original Vortex had its problems: mainly, a short life span. Smack a few trees, or hit a couple light poles and your new Vortex would begin turning over.

In the constant search for finding that perfect midrange overstable driver, Jim Kenner considered injecting Cyclone plastic into older Discraft molds resulting in a slightly different disc. The result with the Vortex is hardly slight. It's a big difference and a good difference.

Right away, we loved the feel. The grip is much more user-friendly than the original model's plastic. Actually, the flight of the new Vortex is not much different than the old—it may not be quite as overstable towards the end of the flight as the original plastic. One reason for this slight difference is the original Vortex is a little flatter. The Cyclone plastic in the same mold causes the discs to pop up a bit with more of a domed flight plate.

The Vortex is not a long-range driver. That's what Discraft makes Cyclones and X-Clones for. It is designed for medium-range drives or long approach shots. And it is incredibly accurate and controllable. It's one of those discs you learn after just a few throws.

The Vortex survived the same exhaustive durability test we subjected to the Aurora: driving over the disc with a minivan, and throwing successive shots against a chain tennis court backstop. The important note here is we subjected the same degree of punishment to the original Vortex and the disc died an early death. The new Vortex, like the Aurora, came out a big winner.

The most impressive thing about the new Vortex is not just its durability. The Vortex's flight pattern changed very little with increasing wear. That translates into predictability which everyone needs when reaching for a disc.



# Practice makes perfect

ello, my name is Timmy Gill. I'm from Edina, Minnesota, and I'm the 1995 Amateur World Disc Golf Champion. I've been playing disc golf for just two years, but I feel I could share some ideas and tips on how to practice and train to improve the amateur disc golfer's game.

Many disc golfers feel the sport is a mental game, and I would agree, but without the physical skills, one would not have a game at all. To achieve the physical skills, you have to practice. When I say practice, I mean practicing over and over until you are comfortable with your mechanics and everything is smooth. If everything is smooth mechanically, you will prevent injuries, plus throw farther, more accurately, and more consistently.

When I started playing two summers

ago, I was like everybody else just starting. I would go out for the pure fun of the game and throw the disc into the woods, street, water, and I had very little control. After two months of screwing around I got my first ace on hole #6 at Lone Lake Park, and that was when I became booked on disc golf. I then realized every time I went out and played it was to practice. At that time, I was practicing to beat my friends. I didn't know about tournaments. When I did finally play in a tournament, I played as an Amateur II and won by five strokes, and realized disc golf was truly a competitive sport. Then, I really started to practice-not to beat my friends, but to beat everybody.

One of the first things I began to do, which I still do today, is take a stack of my favorite drivers to a football field and just crank away. At first I tried to reach the putting practice came in, Every day I would practice putting from all distances but mainly stayed under 40 feet until I was consistently making the 15 to 20footers. Even in the winter, I had my basket in my basement and practiced from around 20 feet. Today I have two baskets. I received a Mach Fore as part of my prize package from the Amateur Worlds. I practice putts even more now-100 to 200 putts daily.

When I decided I was going to make the trip to Cincinnati, I really started to train heavily. Along with putting and driving, I worked on every shot: my midrange shots, rollers, thumbers, anhyzers, hyzers, straight shots. Then, came the real turning point in my game: the sidearm, or two-finger flip throw. I worked on it daily and it came around quickly and naturally because I'm a natural sidearm thrower when I throw a go, which disc to throw, what the wind is doing, etc. There are a lot of things to think about before you throw, but doing them while practicing will make them come more naturally in a tournament situation. When things become more natural, you become more confident. Confidence is the key to the mental side of disc golf. Everybody knows what it is like to have a hot streak-parking all your drives and banging all your putts. Something special happens. At the Amateur Worlds, I had it the whole week. I didn't have to think about it, it came naturally. I felt I couldn't miss. That's the confidence you need all the time. My goal is to consistently possess this level of confidence. I don't have it all the time, but I am noticing improvement.

Finally, a few thoughts on mistakes. Take mistakes in stride. Bad decisions, bad luck, whatever, make the next shot a good shot. At the Am Worlds I was penalized four strokes on the final day for carrying a disc without my name for four holes. I had an 11-stroke lead at the time, but it sure scared me for awhile. I took it as a challenge, and I honestly think it made me play better. I built my lead back to 10 strokes by the start of the final round. That four-stroke penalty unquestionably has made me a better player. I've learned to take mistakes in

I hope what I have shared with you will make you a better player. Just remember that every time you throw a disc, it's practice. Whether it is in your basement, a tournament, driving or putting, you will be making yourself a better player. So take your stack of favorite drivers to a field and crank away. Putt and putt until you can't miss and who knows, one day you may become a professional World Disc Golf Champion. Look out, Kenny!

the 100-yard end zone to end zone drive. I would throw 50-60 drives, two or three times a week. Eventually, I had to start backing up. Today, I have to throw across two soccer fields. That was a real confidence builder when I had to change fields. I have the field marked off every hundred feet up to 500 feet. My goal is to reach 500 feet, but I haven't done it yet.

After a year, I purchased a Mach 1.5 Lite portable from the DGA. It was the best money I've ever spent. This is where

baseball. Now, if a hole is a lefty favored hole, I have the option of a turnover shot or a finger flip. It's a real advantage to have that choice. It was a key ingredient to my winning the Amateur Worlds.

Practicing the mental game is the hardest type of practice. Every time you play a round or even a hole, each shot should be thought through mentally. Visualize each shot and where you want the disc to go. Think about your mechanics, how far you want the disc to

t its conception, Tinicum was an idea shared by many, but pursued by few. Given the lack of courses in the Philadelphia area, Tinicum was a result of efforts of dedicated golfers who took the initiative to find and develop a new course.

After my marriage in 1991, I found myself buying a new home in the suburbs of Philadelphia. I was separated from my "backyard" course, Sedgley Woods, and wanted to return to the joy I had found playing disc golf. I also wanted to introduce new players to the sport, and believed this could only be accomplished by developing a course near where I lived.

recreation director, Julien Boryzewski, every four weeks about the proposed course.

In October, 1992, I made my monthly call to Julien. His response punctured my dreams. Bucks County "did not see themselves developing a disc golf course at this time." I pleaded, begged, cajoled, and basically lost my composure. I could not hang up until I had a reason why. I asked whether there was any location in Bucks County where we could develop a course, even temporary basis.

Julien responded there was one possibility, Tinicum Park in the northern section of the county. I went out to Tinicum the next day and was enthralled by its beauty: the open expanses, the groves of pines, the gentle hills, and the canal on one side with the mighty Delaware River on the other. All these natural joys create the Tinicum

experience.

I mapped the front nine that day, and Joe Mela and I had all 18 holes laid out by the next day. I sent a handdrawn map to Julien, and, in January, 1993, we received the "green light" from the parks department.

Joe formed the Bucks County Whitetails to help fund and install the course. Tinicum Park now stands complete with 18 Mach III baskets.

Tinicum is a mixture of holes. The course has length, woods, wind, water, hyzer, and anhyzer shots. Though the course does not boast elevation changes, it makes up for this with multiple pin placements. The following is a description of the most memorable holes at Tinicum:

#### Hale 1

Hole #1 has one pin placement at 437 feet. This hole is a bane to both right and left handers because of the

> severe left to right turn required after your release. Your disc must fly 70 feet before it can start turning right. Then it must sail downward and across a swill. Most good players end up with a 100 approach. Because this shot is entirely in the open, wind can become a factor. Fours are not

uncommon, and birdies are almost non-existent



I started by contacting county and state parks in the five counties surrounding Philadelphia. At first my conversations led nowhere. The response was lukewarm at best.

Then, in the spring of 1992, Joe Mela contacted me about a park he had found in Bucks County, Playwicki Park. I made contact with someone who could approve a course in the county. I contacted the parks and

Hole 7

Hole #7 plays into Sherwood Forest. The pine trees are only ten feet apart with the basket 205 feet straight ahead. A clean shot will often skip on the pine needles and pass by the basket, leaving a tricky birdie putt.



There are five pin placements on this hole: two at 205', two at 251', and one at 425' that requires pinpoint accuracy throwing through stands of trees not quite five feet apart.

#### Hale 13

Hole #13, the "Gauntlet," elevates players' stress levels. The hole plays 271, 320, or 371 feet through pine trees offering little advantage to those short on power. At 675 feet, trees with low-hanging full branches protect the putting green. Only a low shot or accurate roller make it on the second shot. If the second shot penetrates too far, you may have to putt from behind a row of hedges.

When you finish playing Tinicum Park, you will either love it or leave it, but I doubt you will forget it. We have




and then into an open field. Higher scores prevail as bad shots tend to follow bad shots.

#### Hole 18

Hole #18 is a driving hole. At 766 feet, there are no obstacles for the first 675 feet. Often the wind swirls,

# **Amateurs Divided**

(Writer's note: Try to imagine the first part of this in your mind's ear with an Andy Rooney style voice. It may help.)

ave you ever received a tourney mailer and looked at all the divisions offered and thought "hmmm, which one is for me?" And then you say to yourself "Am I the only one that understands the difference between Am and Advanced? Or was that Am I and II? Are masters advanced or amateur? Are women considered advanced or am? They're charging how much for which division?" Anyone for consistency? And what about those amateur divisions, the PDGA non-professional, Advanced Amateur and, what, Amateur Amateur?

Will everyone please rise while we quote from The Book (Rules for the Sport of Disc Golf, copyright June 1990). Please turn to page 21, 804.08, Classification of Players. Rule A states: "The following classifications shall be used for all PDGA-sanctioned Professional Tour Tournaments. These classifications are to be used to determine who shall compete against whom in these tournaments..." You may be seated.

Let us look first at the Rule Book's word by word definition of players: "Open Pro: Any player." That seems simple enough. Pay the entry fee. Compete with Climo. You don't have to qualify or anything, just pay the fee and, you're a pro! "Advanced: Amateur

players who have competed previously." What does this mean? I've played in a tournament. I have competed, therefore, I am Advanced. Right. Should be a lot more Advanced ams out there at those tourneys, huh? "Amateur: All new players (beginners)." All. New. Beginners.

#### OUR LOCAL DEFINITION ...

When I first got started in disc golf, the local club was defining the amateur players' divisions with Novice Am II. and Am II. We defined the novice as first time tournament participants. Am II players were those who had used up their novice status and now were Intermediate. They weren't considered beginners any more, so they'd play in Am II for a while. The Am I golfers were the experienced ones. They were competitive and attended several tourneys on the road. At our last B-tier tourney where I was the TD, we offered the following amateur divisions: Juniors, Novice, Intermediate Women, Intermediate Men, Advanced Women, and Advanced Men. Sorry, no Masters

After I had sent in the tournament report, I received a letter back from the PDGA administrator. In response to my adding the division of Intermediate, the letter said that this is "not a PDGA approved division, and you did not specify the division as one you would offer on your tournament application. Please be aware that this division should not be offered in PDGA sanctioned events." Did all of those TDs out there who "offered" Am I, Am II, Amateur Masters, and/or Am II Masters

also receive a letter addressing this? There were no Roman numerals or Amateur Masters in the section of divisions offered on the PDGA tourney application form. The inconsistency starts here.

The way our club and I explained it was as follows. Novices were beginners, i.e., their first time in competition. The amateurs were split into the Intermediate and Advanced. Intermediate wasn't one of the choices being offered on the application form, so I added it. I wrote back and explained our concept of first timers being labeled as Novice, not "Amateur: All new players (beginners)." Hey, I thought our system was as easy as 1, 2, 3 - 1. Novice, 2. Intermediate, and 3. Advanced. Come on, guys. (We'll talk about the gals in a minute.) Just how many times did you play in PDGA towrneys in that "Amateur" division? After you've played at this level more than once or twice, are you really "new players That's the PDGA (beginners)." definition anyway.

#### POINTS...WHO GETS EM

It is my understanding only Advanced Amateurs get to earn PDGA points, not the Amateur Amateurs. Does this mean when a tourney has a division of Amateur Masters those players cannot earn points? Or when there is only one division of Masters are they considered equivalent to Advanced Amateurs, in that they can receive points? If there is only one division of Amateur Women, the PDGA members who pay their two bucks can earn points. What if the divisions is listed as Amateur Masters? At least three sanctioned tourneys in the Midwest this year had divisions labeled Am II Masters or Amateur Masters, not Advanced Masters. Confused? Advanced whatever gets points.

#### THE MASTERS AGE QUESTION

In my own humble opinion, and it's probably influenced by being 37 years old now, 40 should probably be the cut-off for the divisions known as Masters. Now, for those out there who say "Oh, sure, then why did you play in Masters divisions this summer? What's up with that, huh?" OK, I confess to succumbing to the temptation. The temptation of registration fees being the same and the field sizes three to one, Advanced Ams to Masters. I took on the smaller field. Sorry.

If disc golf wants to get those 35+ "Master" golfers to play in Advanced Amateurs and Open Pro, then the TDs have got to charge less for the divisions of Masters. And they need to charge more for Advanced Am and Open Pro. This should give the incentive to play against the stiffer competition. Like I said earlier, when the prices and prizes are comparable, why should an older player decrease his or her odds of taking home a prize (or cash) if the entry fees are the same and the fields are dramatically different? And posing THE rhetorical question: Shouldn't the divisions really be by skill level instead of age (at least up to 40 anyway)?

#### WOMEN AND CHILDREN FIRST

With reference to our female golfers, we have to figure out a way to get them out and throwing. 'This can't be stressed enough. I dream of the day when the playing field is fifty-fifty. Right now it's about what, 1 in 10? All of the amateur and pro divisions should

be duplicated and offered for the female players. Like the juniors, we simply must encourage more women to take part. The division of Juniors should be handled by the local clubs and TDs. They can be split up by age groups and sex. The more divisions you create the more winners you will have, and hopefully, encourage the kids to keep playing and become Beginning Amateurs. Our local state games tourney divisions for the young are 9 and Under, 10-12, and 13-15. There are some 16 year olds out there who can and do throw with the best of the advanced

#### PLAYING RECREATIONALLY

There has been some discussion by Ed Headrick about the importance of the recreational player and the recent development of the Recreational Disc Golf Association. I agree we need to incorporate this level into organized disc golf. However, recreational divisions will probably not be used in A and B tiers. They would be utilized in C tourneys and the local events that aren't sanctioned. If the disc gulfer is playing well enough to take part in the A or B level, they'll move up. Recreational is for the person who plays once or twice a month at the local course, never travels, and only plays in a couple of local tourneys per year.

# ONE SOLUTION: TWO AMS AND THE SEMI-PRO

Is there a simpler way ofdividing skill levels? For new players, let's call 'em what they are: Beginning Amateurs. The next level up is the Advanced Amateurs. And for those current Advanced Ams that aren't quite hot enough to go to Open Pro, let's try the Semi-Pro. Why not? Set up your fees and prize structure in an equitable way. The amount you're willing to shell out for registration fee should be directly proportional to what you may win. New players are inexperienced so they pay next to nothing: award a few discs to top third, maybe a trophy for first, and they will be happy. Award Advanced Amateurs with a few discs and bigger trophies. Our currently "accepted" level of top Advanced Amateurs who don't want to spend the money yet for Pro-Open can compete in Semi-Pro. There has been some discussion about this in the DG press. The top third of this division wins prizes or cash equivalent. If the sponsoring club is handing out prizes to the still-wanna-stay ams, fine. The cash stays with the tourney.

Disc golf prize philosophy has to correspond with the player, the division, and how much money is paid. How much is the player risking? If someone wants to sandbag and play down, let 'em. They're not going to win much for their skilled play. Spread out your amateur tourney budget for CTPs, door prizes, and players' packs. Make sure everybody gets something. Award those willing to risk it in the Semi-Pro and Open Pro with the big cash and big prizes. And please remember this: disc golf is also supposed to be fun.

# Mental toughness/Killer instinct

e all know a player must develop a certain amount of physical skill to have an edge in competitions. In disc golf there are the basics one must master to become competitive: grip, smooth swing, a coordinated step-up, etc. Once a solid level of physical skills has been achieved, I would estimate the mental game comprises 75% of the total package of what a top player brings to the course. The focus of this article is the mind game. Most of all, I would like you to understand the difference between the mental game and golf mentality.

The mental game is thinking, wondering, and sometimes wishing things will go your way. It also plays a part after bad throws or unfortunate bounces that add to your score. The most important aspect to remember about the mental game is once something has happened, it can't be changed. Get it out of your head and begin focusing on your next shot.

On the other hand, possessing good golf mentality can predetermine the course of events. For example, when your game is going bad, trying harder is not the answer. Trying smarter is. If you have watched professional ball golfers on television you will notice when they miss putts they usually end up very close to the cup. We play the same game, it just happens to be with flying discs. The basic object is to get closer to the target with every shot and eventually in the target. You're going to have bad rounds, but how you deal with those rounds can make a bad round simply bad or a true nightmare.

You probably won't see ball golfers putting from 20 feet, missing, and running 20 feet past the cup. Not so in disc golf. How many times have you seen a disc golfer three-putt because his/her second putt was actually longer or more difficult than their first? This is where golf mentality comes in. Developing touch, which includes distance, accuracy, and speed, will enable a player to play aggressive and smart.

Okay, you've made your disc selection and it's your turn to throw. You're standing on the tee pad. What's going through your head? If you're thinking about making a deuce or putting the disc in a specific place, think again. The pre-shot routine is not the place to be thinking about the start to go sour. This change in thinking requires a committment. It is the true definition of golf mentality.

Finally, killer instinct is knowing

outcome. After you release the disc, then think about outcome. Try to put thoughts of outcome out of your mind, while intently focusing on the process of a successful release.

When I'm at my best and all the mental stages are clicking, I develop a killer instinct. Knowing where and how to throw becomes second nature through the help of the pre-shot process. Keep it simple: factor in the basics—trees, wind, O.B., and turf. You can control the process, and ultimately, the process controls the outcome.

Have the will to be disciplined. Do the same things consistently before every attempt. Most of all, stick with it. Don't change the minute things when to hold them or when to fold them—i.e. when to lay up or go for it. You must develop this through past experiences. Draw on your knowledge of percentages, upon making or attempting to make a desired throw. This theory will aid tremendously in building your killer instinct to the point of a sixth sense.




