The Prez Box

The year is coming to a close. This is the last newsletter of 1992. I have taken some time to reflect back on this year, and all that has transpired. In terms of advancements of our sport in this area, 1992 has been a banner year. We have seen the installation of a Disc Golf course in the Roanoke Valley, culminating 14 years of work on the part of myself and members of the RFDA. In a previous newsletter, I expressed appreciation to those who have helped in the endeavor, and I will not elaborate on them again. They know who they are, and I thank them. We have had a multitude of attention from the media, but not in the way we had hoped for. However, the attention that the media paid to the controversy of the Disc Golf Course at Fishburn Park was a blessing in disguise. I know that the group that opposed the course wanted the course taken out, and hoped that the course would see little use. Their actions, however, brought an abundance of attention to this new sport. We saw use of the course increase dramatically after their opposition was made known to the

public. People wanted to see what all the ruckus was about. Most found that the opposition was groundless, trivial, and merely smoke from a group of people that cannot work or play, or for that matter, live well with others. Although the RFDA had to take a middle ground in an agreement to downsize the course, we are still ahead as we still have a course to play and the public has not lost a new sport and fitness opportunity. I hold no grudges against the opposition, but I feel sorry for them. I would hate to live with that much of a chip on my shoulder. My parents brought me up much better than that. In light of the fact that major strides were made in our sport in the area of Disc Golf, we have been lacking in other aspects of Disc Sports. We made very little progress in Ultimate, Field Events, and general disc play. Hopefully, we will be able to address these areas next year. I am counting on the members of the Executive Committee to take a more active role in assisting in the advancement of the club. I hope that more people that like our sport will join the RFDA and make our voice stronger and prouder. I know that 1993 will be a busy year for the sport and the RFDA, but we must be ready for it. We started the movement, and we must continue to lead it. We are the people that others look to for assistance, and help. I am assisting people from around the nation that have heard of our accomplishments and want our knowledge and advice. We

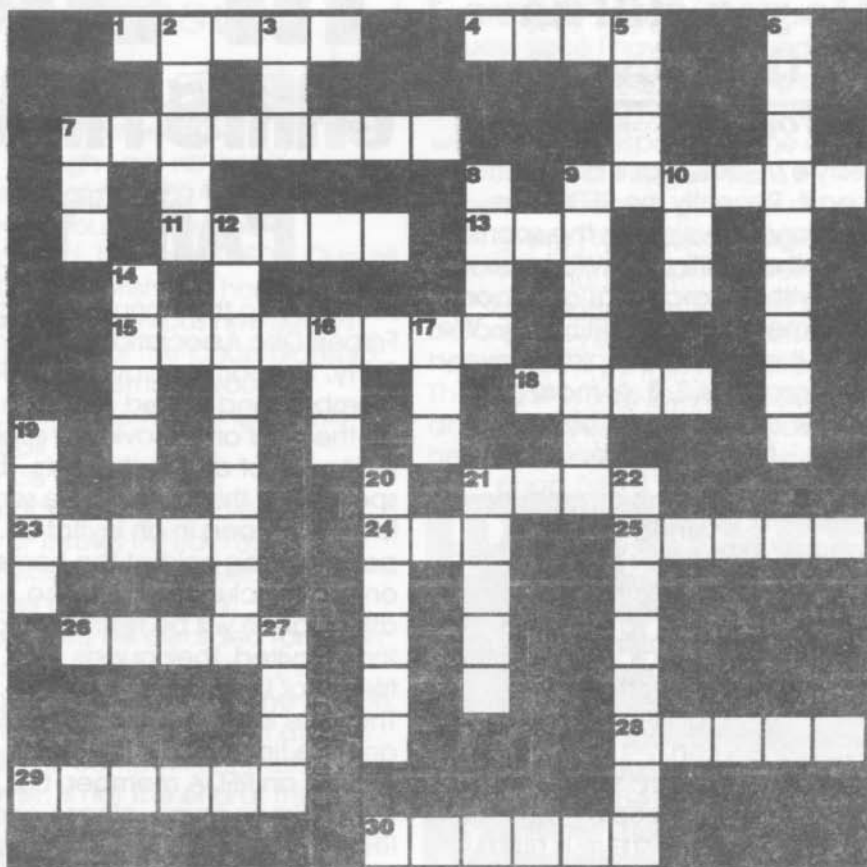

Even though I am no longer secretary of the RFDA, there is one project I would like to see completed. That is the RFDA Overall Disc Championships. I have explained in previous newsletters the concept of the Championship. Each RFDA member would compete in the following events, Disc Golf Distance

Accuracy (using two different styles of throws for each), MTA (Maximum Time Aloft) SCF (Self Caught Flight).

Points would be awarded for each position and the winner of the championship would be the person with the highest point total at the end of the competition. That, however, is not the end of the idea. Each month after the first competition, a person could challenge the person immediately above him for his position. The winner would either move up a position or remain in the same position. At the end of each year, whoever was still in first place would be crowned that years overall club champion. There is a little more to it, but I only wanted to briefly bring the subject up in everyones mind again. I hope we can work it out to actually hold the championship next spring. Players have voiced a overwhelming preference to Disc Prizes rather than dust collecting trophies. That will be honored whenever possible in the future. There will still be some trophy events, but they will be the larger events. This is the new addition. All Tournament entrants will fill out a slip with their name on it. These will be held to the end of the tournament. After all the prizes are awarded, those players who did not place will have their name slip placed into a drawing box. Those who placed in their division and won prizes will not be in this

drawing. From the names in the box, drawings will be held for additional prizes. We are doing this so entrants that do not place can still win a prize by attending the tournaments. I think this will appeal to the learning players and those who wish to play for fun, without the pressure of top level competition. Let us know how you feel about this idea. We hope you will like it.

How To Stay On The RFDA Mailing List

So you want to be sure you know of upcoming Tournaments and Disc Activities. And you want to know how to do that. My first recommendation would be to join the Roanoke Frisbee Disc Association. We are the organizers of almost all of the Major Disc Events in this area. RFDA Members know of all events before they are released to the public. RFDA Members also have a voice in all events being held and introduction of new events. If, for some reason, you do not want to join the RFDA, attendance at RFDA Events will put you on a rotating Mailing list, and that list is 2 Events long. In other words, if you enter a Disc Golf Tournament, you will receive mailings on the next 2 events. If you do not attend those events, you will be dropped from the mailing list. If you attend another event, the cycle resets. This is to keep us from sending out mailings and spending funds on people that do not attend. However, there is an alternative. The RFDA will keep people on the mailing list for a period of one year with no entry requirements, but the fee is \$5.00 to cover mailing costs. Those are the options. The Rites of Autumn Disc Golf Tournament An Overview

The Rites Of Autumn. It was a tournament that tried the new 9 hole course configuration at Fishburn Park. Entries were limited to 45, but that amount was never reached. Entries for the tournament totaled out at 21. There were 6 entries in the Advanced Division, 10 in the Amateur Division, and 5 in the RFDA Division.

The RFDA Division was restricted to current members of the Roanoke Frisbee Disc Association. It was a beautiful October day, with a bit of a fierce breeze popping up on occasion, usually at the most inopportune times.

Registration was a bit late and Tee-Off was delayed. The first round started at approximately 11:15 A.M.. I was once again Tournament Director for this event, but since Cheryl Kessler was once again on hand to assist in handling the event, and since it was on the 9 hole course and the number of entries was a manageable number, I decided to enter into the RFDA Division. The RFDA Division consisted of Mike Overacker, Dorsey Taylor, Jim Robertson, Chris Beyer, and new

member, John Cutler. Since we were running a fivesome, we were last to finish the first round. After the first 9 holes, I led the RFDA division by 2 strokes over Chris Beyer, and 4 strokes over Dorsey Taylor, who held 3rd place. In the Amateur Division, Greg Doane held a 4 stroke lead over Gary Kraterfield, with Bill Sylvester and Gordon Lee tied 5 strokes back of Greg. In the Advanced Division, Kevin Morris had a 2 stroke lead over Tony Webber, and Gary Foster was 1 stroke behind Tony. At the start of the second 9 holes, things were reasonably close in all divisions. As the second round scores started coming in, the scoreboard changed in all divisions. In the RFDA group, I had matched my first round score, but so did Dorsey, so I still held a 4 stroke lead after Round 2. However, Jim Robertson had evidently warmed up and had his long, straight drives going and took over 3rd from Chris Beyer, who was having a bit of wind trouble. In the Amateur Division, Greg Doane stretched his lead to 5 strokes over Gary Kraterfield, but Bill Sylvester pulled one stroke ahead of Gordon Lee to break the tie for third. In the Advanced Division, Gary Foster fired a smoking second round to stay within 3 strokes of Kevin Morris, who was still in the lead. Tony Webber had slipped to third, 2 strokes back of Gary. While most everyone took a lunch break, RFDA entrant Chris Beyer and Amateur Helen Hammond played a round so Helen could finish the tournament and get to work on time. As most of

the players were coming back from lunch, Chris and Helen were finishing their final round. Round 3 was started, with the players matched according to scores and divisions. At the end of the last round, in the Advanced Division, Kevin Morris shot another good round and took first. Gary Foster matched his score for round three and took second. Alan Hogan came from 3 strokes back and took third from Tony Webber. In the Amateur Division, Greg Doane shot his best round in Round 3 and won the Amateur Division by 11 STROKES! Bill Sylvester crept up and took second from Gary Kraterfield. Gary finished in third place, 1 stroke back. In the Womens Break of the Amateur Division, Helen Hammond took First and won a disc prize. In the RFDA Division, I started with a 4 stroke lead over Dorsey Taylor, but as Dorsey played, he continually chopped away at my lead. At the tee of the last hole, Dorsey and I were tied. It was Hole #9, and Dorsey drove a nice shot through the break in the trees and had a good lie in the fairway on the hill. My drive clipped the tree to the left of the gap and dropped me straight down. My second shot carried and went past the hole and over the embankment behind the hole. Dorsey laid up his second shot about 8 feet short of the hole. My third shot hit low and Dorsey made his putt to take the win by one stroke. What a great finish it was,

and although I would have liked to win, I really have to take my hat off to the incredible play of Dorsey. It was something to behold. I really had a blast at this tournament. I finally got to play in one of the tournaments. It was great. I wish to thank Cheryl Kessler for the great assistance that she always provides for these tournaments. Thanks also to Jim Robertson, as he always seems to be around when I need him. And THANKS to all the people that enter these tournaments. I hope you all have as much fun, in these events, as I get out of providing them.
